The Westerlies to Showcase at the 2016 CMA Conference

Seattle's chamber-jazz quartet **The Westerlies** were selected to showcase at Chamber Music America's 2016 national conference. Along with 17 other ensembles from around the country, The Westerlies (Riley Mulherkar and Zubin Hensler, trumpet, and Andy Clausen and Willem de Koch, trombone) will have the opportunity to showcase their music to many presenters, managers, musicians, and chamber music enthusiasts attending the conference.

KPLU Plans to Acquire KUOW

In a recent vote by the University of Washington's Board of Regents, plans

were approved for public radio station KUOW to acquire KPLU's broadcasting license for \$8 million. Details are to be finalized by late December, then will be submitted to the Federal Communications Commission, pending approval.

At the meeting, KUOW President Caryn Mathes said there are no short-term plans to change KPLU's programming, but the station will eventually carry an all-jazz format.

PLU President Thomas Krise also commented on the acquisition after the vote was announced. "We believe it makes sense for these two stations – that have long shared a common mission and a common region – to come

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Industrial Revelation: Toward an "Everything" Music

"When we first started playing, I thought, this is 'everything music."

Industrial Revelation is not a musical entity easily pinned down, but keyboardist Josh Rawlings' invocation of "everything music" points in the right direction. Rawlings and his bandmates Evan Flory-Barnes (upright bass), D'Vonne Lewis (drums) and Ahamefule J. Oluo (trumpet) ioined me on a recent afternoon to ponder the myriad possible ways to define what this singular quartet is all about. Earshot's John Gilbreath, who has championed the band since they first hit the scene, has a take: "To me, the genius of Industrial Revelation is its inherent ability to obliterate imagined walls between genres and camps of music lovers."

Spend some time hanging with these creative co-conspirators and it's easy to see the obvious affection and mutual respect they have for each other. As they crest their 10-year anniversary as a band (with no personnel changes), the members of Industrial Revelation speak about the group as a brotherhood, in almost spiritual terms. Flory-Barnes says of their first jam, "I thought we were just getting together to play and see what happens, but from that first moment, it was a 'thing'...It just felt natural."

The band has always functioned intuitively, without musical conflict. This is only possible when a very special chemistry is shared. Oluo explains, "Expressing yourself involves trust, knowing that people are going to be there to understand what you're trying to express....Everyone in the band is engaged as a primary partner

in the music. That's the way that every song has worked since we started."

The band members all keep busy with a slew of sideman gigs, and Oluo also maintains a vibrant career in stand-up comedy and theater, but Industrial Revelation remains a central commitment for all four. Rawlings sums it up: "This music fed my soul and my heart....We do have to juggle. It isn't easy, but it is easy to say yes to doing music that we love."

The spirit is only getting stronger – and to prove the point, the band has just released *Liberation & the Kingdom of Nri*, a two-CD set covering a dizzying rainbow of styles and moods. In an era dominated by short attention spans and YouTube plays, the notion of a double album is bold, almost a throwback. It's a challenge issued, both to the artists creating it and to

the listener. Industrial Revelation is clearly up to the task.

The "everything" notion pops up again, as Oluo elaborates: "There is a conscious attempt to make it an 'everything' album, to embrace that concept....We've amassed knowledge, we've amassed material and history. We can present a big picture."

The picture is wide-angle, and the album's original compositions, contributed by all members, span genres and eras: anthemic and psychedelic rock flavors, tender piano interludes, stringladen soundtrack vibes and electronic textures, '70s vintage soul and fusion, and heartfelt melodies leavened with the timeless spirit of New Orleans. Lewis smiles knowingly, and puts it simply: "It's a gumbo."

What's also notable about the album is that the band is clearly following their hearts, not chasing trends. Oluo says they approached collaboration "in a very non-analytical way. A very thoughtful way, emotionally, but we don't really get into creating a 'strategy' to approaching a song."

When we spoke, the band was preparing for a West Coast tour, and, for a unit that operates in a spirit of vibe and interaction, it's no surprise that the live experience is spoken about in modes of transcendence. Rawlings says, "We want everyone to be involved. I don't get super into the 'woo,' but you can't deny an energy in the room, with the sonic vibration and people pouring love at you."

Oluo chimes in: "We're always searching for our own humanity on stage, and when you do that, you're getting to the core of other people's humanity....If you find something real and you get it out, people will feel that."

For an "everything" band like Industrial Revelation, finding the right venue can be a delicate art. There's no obvious pipeline or well-worn path through a particular scene, and the band's spirit of inclusion draws a varied audience.

"There's not really an infrastructure for us," says Oluo. "We don't really fall under the jazz infrastructure, we don't fall under the indie-rock infrastructure."

Lewis adds: "People will say, 'You should play here, this is a big venue.' But is it a hang? Is it a good vibe?"

This search for the right vibe enables the band to be successful playing gigs in often-unconventional venues, from warehouses to shopping malls. As Oluo points out, "It doesn't matter where it is, you can have a great show anywhere."

The band is outward looking, but their commitment to the Seattle scene is palpable, and they pay tribute to the astounding range of Seattle music history. After invoking Jimi Hendrix, Quincy Jones, and Shabazz Palaces, Oluo elaborates, "There's as much Alice in Chains in what I'm doing as there is Louis Armstrong! ... I feel a bond to Seattle music. The grunge era was during my early teenage formative years - I usually wear flannel to this day! [laughs] To know the streets... to know the schools that those people came out of, there's something special about that."


Flory-Barnes adds, "All the eras of Seattle music, high points ranging from the Jackson Street days, the early days of jazz, to the Wheedle's Groove days...that's all in our music."

Genre agnosticism aside, Industrial Revelation will no doubt continue to find themselves appointed as ambassa-

The 2015 Sacred Music of Duke Ellington Concert

Not a great deal is known about the private life of Edward Kennedy "Duke" Ellington. The man who became the musical voice of an era, and who would become known simply as "The Duke," was an incredibly private person, even within his own family. But we do know that he was a religious man. Growing up, his mother took him to church twice each Sunday. He is reported to have read the Bible seven times.

So perhaps it's not surprising that the man who gave the world such songs as "It Don't Mean A Thing (If It Ain't Got That Swing)" and "In A Sentimental Mood" spent a good portion of the later years of life at work on music that reflected his spiritual leanings.

Ellington's "Sacred Concerts" series originated when the Reverend at San Francisco's Grace Cathedral approached The Duke about composing a liturgical work for the church. Ellington accepted and got to work on a composition that would combine jazz, spirituals, gospel music, dance, and narration in dramatic fashion. His familiarity with biblical texts and

theatrical experience no doubt proved useful in this endeavor. The work also functions as a kind of staged pageant.

In the first concert, which premiered at the Grace Cathedral in 1965, the phrase "In the Beginning God" appears throughout as a kind of *idée fixe*, either sung by the choir or played as a six-note motif in a variety of instrumental formats. Since the piece is a bit like a suite built around songs and interludes, the "In the Beginning God" phrase serves as a unifying element that ties the diverse set of arrangements together.

Ellington composed two more Sacred Concerts in the ensuing years. (Contemporary "Sacred Concerts" are often assembled from material drawn from all three.) The final one, composed in the last year of life (and after he had been diagnosed with lung cancer), premiered at London's Westminster Abbey and dedicated to the United Na-







Jazz Jams and Hangs

Jazz haunts, liquor, and dancing formed the foundation of our city's musical history, and the following weekly jams keep this legacy alive. Jams attract both active performing musicians and beginners in the community, coming together to practice the essential ingredients of jazz: listening, improvisation, and finding gigs.

Do you have a favorite tune you love to sing or play? Do you want to learn to play songs out of the Real Book, or improvise with a new song or style you haven't played before? Jams are a great way to make new friends, find gigs, start new projects, exchange favorite songs and albums, and learn about the burgeoning music scene around you.

Angry Beaver

The Beaver Sessions Sundays, 9pm

Established with the goal of hosting "a party every Sunday night where people can come and play or just hang out and not worry about feeling obligated to play," this straight-ahead session is enjoyed by local, and sometimes touring, musicians, in addition to regulars who come just to listen to the music (complemented by poutine on the table and hockey on the screens). Local musician Max Holmberg leads the session with his trio, a group of promising young musicians he de-

Future Jazzheads is another unique jam, giving middle and high school students the opportunity to spend time on stage working alongside professionals.

If you're really looking to expand your musical taste and sonic vocabulary, you have to check out the Racer Sessions. Organized by Seattle record label Table & Chairs, this decidedly modern jam features a guest artist or group, followed by a jam focusing on free or collective improvisation that "frequently incorporates the aesthetic and techniques of avant-garde jazz and classical music." Groups spontaneously form to the side of the stage, and

each group's set is recorded and documented on the Racer Sessions website.

The Racer Sessions also recently launched an improvisation fundamentals classed called "Improvisation is for Everyone!" From 6:30-7:30pm on the third Sunday of every month, experienced improvisers facilitate an inclusive, nurturing space for people of all ages, ability levels, and disciplines to collaborate and learn about collective improvisation.

One of the liveliest jams in Seattle, the EntreMundos Jam session at Capitol Cider is host to a worldly crowd of musicians. Described as "the most diverse and groovy series of jam sessions," you can expect to hear "a groove-centered link between the worlds of jazz, Brazilian, Latin, blues, R&B, funk, and much more." The jam kicks off with a set from Adriana Giordano (vocals), Eric Verlinde (keyboard), Dean Schmidt (bass), Jeff Busch (drums), Ernesto Pediangco and Tor Dietrichson (percussion). Giordano says, "The styles change throughout the evening, and we do a really good job keeping it balanced and interesting in terms of energy. While we have a six-piece house band with some of the most sought after musicians in Seattle, we get to play and learn from other musicians with different levels of proficiency."



Featuring stellar musicianship, this weekly event promises to act as a memorable learning experience for all musicians, young and old. Verlinde and Martinez keep the ball rolling, and the jam as open as possible.

Pianist Verlinde recommends that young players "spend time learning

It provides an opportunity for musicians to work with and study a particular group of songs each week, and emerge with a deeper musical understanding and appreciation of the innovators and standard bearers of the art form.

6 Steps to Attending Jam Sessions

Step 1: Go to as many jam sessions as you can.

Step 2: Listen.

Step 3: Introduce yourself to the musicians and share in the community.

Step 4: Repeat.

Step 5: Practice – at home – favorite tunes, the heads, rhythmic hits, improvisation, and musicianship.

Step 6: Show up, ready to socialize and perform well together.

dors to run the "jazz" gauntlet. This is a role well-cast: A durable and repeated band story is of fans telling them "they didn't think they liked jazz, but are now inspired to dig in to other realms of the music."

Oluo remarks, "We're on the verge of a really interesting time for jazz. I was afraid of the label 'jazz' for a long

tions. It was in the opening remarks to this concert that Ellington made his oft-quoted statement – both a declaration and a defense – that "Every man prays in his own language, and there is no language that God doesn't understand."

For the past 25 years Earshot Jazz has helped make Ellington's "Sacred Concerts" a staple of the Seattle holiday season's musical fare. The concert features the **Seattle Repertory Jazz Orchestra**, vocalists **Stephen Newby** and **Nichol Veneé Eskridge**, the **Northwest Chamber Chorus** directed by Mark Kloepper, and tap-dancer **Alex Dugdale**.

Founded in 1995, SRJO is the Northwest's premier big band jazz ensemble. Co-directed by drummer Clarence time, and now I feel like I can embrace it again."

Rawlings provides a final thought: "I think jazz in a sense is an 'everything music.' It's more of an idea, of freedom of expression....To be a vehicle to go deeper into any style of music that we really want to."

Go deep with Industrial Revelation – it's a trip well worth taking.



Brockman teaches at the University of Washington and did his doctoral work on Ellington's orchestration techniques.

Nichol Venée Eskridge is a minister of music and appears with the SRJO on their *Sacred Music of Duke Ellington* CD. Stephen Newby holds a doctorate in musical arts and serves as director of the Gospel Choir and the Worship Arts Ensemble at Seattle Pacific University. Tap dancer Alex Dugdale is a product of the jazz programs at Eckstein and Roosevelt, as well as the Eastman School of Music.

Andy ClausenShutter Volume 1

Self-released

Andy Clausen's newest project SHUTTER continues to delve into his unique compositional style, blending quaint and emotionally charged Americana melodies, compelling Stravinsky-esque polytonality, and strong rhythmic material that runs the gamut from ethereal drones to odd-meter waltzes. These appealingly transparent influences all merge into a singular sound that is becoming increasingly unique to Clausen and his cohorts: Gregg Belisle-Chi and Gregory Uhlmann on electric guitars, Mitch Lyon on cello, and Riley Mulherkar on trumpet - musicians whom are not to be taken lightly.

At its core, SHUTTER is a multimedia work. Each piece is paired with the photograph that inspired it. These extra-musical aspects could potentially minimize the music, setting up the audience to look for concrete connections to the photos, essentially

reducing the music to concrete visual elements of the photos. But Clausen walks the fine line of being intentionally vague, and the result is that each moment of music is a surprise. The compositions twist and turn in ways that one could never conceive of from the photos, and yet each piece seems to fit each photo so well. It's a wholly satisfying statement.

Velocity *Displacement Over Time*

Self-released

Tacoma-based jazz-prog-funk fusion quartet Velocity have released their second album, *Displacement Over Time*. The modern compositions, written by keyboardist and group founder Peter Adams, emphasize sharp harmonic changes and doubled melody lines, particularly noticeable in songs like "Penrose," and used to greater harmonic effect in "Reflections."

Interestingly enough, it is acceleration – the change in velocity over



time – that pervades most strongly throughout the album. "Mosaic," a track reminiscent of Joshua Redman's "Jazz Crimes," showcases the quartet's abrupt changes in velocity and harmonic direction.

Adams and bassist Rob Hutchinson take turns opening many of the tracks with intriguing uncommon timed licks, in songs like "Luna," which switches creatively between 18/8 and 4/4 time. Hutchinson opens "Generator" with a neat lick in 7/8, and contributes voluminous solos throughout the album. Brian Smith also adds tasteful drum solos, and exhibits his versatility navigating through many styles with his hip-hop inspired rhythms on "Accelerate Expansion" and funky stylings on "Velocity."

The tight rhythm section supports saxophonist Cliff Colón's confident solos as the group marches forward with a consistent velocity, and a mix that sets the track right down the center. Though the quartet cover many styles, they are firmly rooted in jazz, paying their respects with quick nods to standards "Butterfly," "Salt Peanuts," and "Meditation" in their solos. As a whole, *Displacement Over Time* offers a very skillful approach to modern jazz-fusion.

Carrie Wicks *Maybe*

OA2 Records

Seattle vocalist Carrie Wicks has presented an album that leads the mind to wander and fall into deep



tonal seduction. The lyricism within Maybe provides listeners with a form of storytelling unlike any other. There is a palpable sense of maturity found in Wicks' writing, one that teeters between states of pensiveness and supreme delectation. The opening track "Ghost of a Perfect Flame" has an empathetic nature, forcing out concepts of empirical realism and glimpses into the artist's own selfreflection. The vulnerability brought through her lyrics has made the mood of the album much more sincere. Showcasing pianist Bill Anschell, drummer Byron Vannoy, and bassist Jeff Johnson, the quartet orchestrates sounds that are almost haunting, complemented by a constantly tranquil undertone. This is no album meant for background noise at an overpriced coffee shop, but rather an intelligent and unique listening experience worth venturing into.

Evan Woodle Nth

Table & Chairs

Nth is drummer Evan Woodle's debut solo release. It's an expansive and undulating 21-minute composition and the latest addition to the Table & Chairs label. Nth finds a fitting home in T&C's catalogue of distinctly Northwest progressive jazz: it's dark, brooding, and urgent, yet somehow celebratory and uplifting in its catharsis.

Repetition plays a major role here. Woodle takes the listener through a myriad of different sections driven by the development of polyrhythms. But what makes this piece special is not Woodle's masterful execution of these complex and fascinating polyrhythms (because it is indeed masterful), but his expert orchestration. *Nth*'s relentless momentum is derived from Woodle's subtle and tasteful manipulation of dynamics, pacing, and especially



the specific timbre of each drum and cymbal. The music was recorded and mixed in such a way that the drums sound like synths more often than not. The upper harmonics of both the drums and cymbals are allowed to ring out, allowing the listener to hear many discrete pitches.

The legendary drummer Billy Hart once said that certain rhythms are inextricably tied to harmony. Here we have a beautiful manifestation of that idea, where the rhythms transcend their basic meaning and begin functioning on a higher level: that of harmonic development. This is a visionary work.

As part of the additive color series, Rik Wright's Fundamental Forces' *Green* brings completion to an exciting and bombastic trilogy. The arrangements Wright creates tastefully capture elements of controlled intensity and tonal versatility. The album showcases bassist Geoff Harper, wind instrumentalist James DeJoie, and drummer Greg Campbell. Tracks "Sugar Crash" and "Harmonic Tremor" represent the



lively, more energetic side of the quartet, whereas softer arrangements, like on the DeJoie composition "Alicia's Waltz" (the only track not penned by

Wright), provide listeners with comfortably emotive transitions. What makes this album a true standout is the unification heard within the quartet's playing. The players Wright has gathered perform in a style that seems to possess an omnipresent balance, with an inexplicable pulse. Wright's complex composition shines through eloquently, as if to reflect an elaborate painting flurrying with color. The album is well-rounded and can easily complement the tastes of any listening preference, demonstrating a whole new definition of "easy listening."


