New Year's Revolutions

First off, a gigantic Thank You to all of you, for making this an incredible year. It was an exciting year for the city of Seattle, a banner year for our brilliant jazz and cultural community, a remarkably successful year for the Earshot Jazz organization, and a fulfilling year for me, personally.

This month marks my 25th anniversary as Earshot's Executive Director.

But, even though I've been engaged in this work longer than many of the people I work with have been alive, I find myself now focusing more on renewal than retrospective. I'll gladly join my young colleagues working more clearly on the future, and the unavoidable opportunities in front of us; and I am grateful to bring along a bit of the hard-won perspective that my years have forced upon me.

I've never considered myself to be an optimist, but I find myself positively moved by the profound negative reactions to the recent elections, and the suddenly overt, and uncomfortably close, presence of the darker forces at work in the world. And, by darker forces, I'll just come out and say the words we've all seen: hatred, bigotry, racism, sexism, violence, suspicion, arrogance, supremacy, exclusion, aggression, cultural oppression, censorship, xenophobia, homopho-

bia, and on and on. These seem to be the new domain that threatens our national future. I suggest that we consider what the exact opposite of each of those words means to us, individually, and resolve to put them into action every new day.

Someone once said, "Never let a crisis go to waste." Great opportunities can be cleverly disguised as serious problems. And we do have a problem. We've all been fairly comfortable in the calm and theoretically inclusive clouds of our liberal skies, but the storm clouds are growing. We now have, literally, the chanceof-a-lifetime to get crystal clear on our own personal values, to find our voice for action, to feel the connections to our fellow humans, and to put ourselves to work for each other's good. Get up. Get out. Put your love into action. Do one new positive thing each day. Speak up for someone. Help someone else.

And let's double up on art and beauty. John Coltrane said, "I just want to be a force for good." Jimi Hendrix said that peace comes "when the power of love replaces the love of power." That's a big one. But we each have some power, and we can decide to use it for good, in our own way, in a new way, every day, starting now.

I first showed up as a volunteer usher

for the Earshot Jazz Festival in 1990, at the second of two concerts - ever - by the International Creative Music Orchestra. Out of the creative vision of Earshot founder, Gary Bannister, the ICMO brought artists from "communist" East Germany together with improvisers from New York and the Seattle community, to express common language under the baton of Butch Morris. I thought about that concert last month, at one of our recent festival concerts by Jaimeo Brown's Transcendence. I thought, "Yeah, this is what Earshot Jazz does best": the magic that this organization provides is the revolution inside the evolution, and the value of individual expression to improve the good of the greater whole.

Happy Holidays. Happy New Year. We'll see you out there.



Live Jazz Thursday: 10 Years of Creation, Collaboration & Community at Barca

In case you needed a little uplift, here's a reminder: Seattle music makers and fans are a lucky bunch. The city is blessed with and supportive of a music scene bursting with jam session opportunities and convivial music hangs. From up-and-coming (Beaver Sessions at the Angry Beaver), to experimental/free improv (Café Racer), burning straight-ahead (Owl 'n Thistle), eclectic Latin (EntreMundos at Capitol Cider), or funky groove (Mo' Jam at Nectar), there is always great music playing somewhere. But even in a crowded field like this, drummer Adam Kessler and bassist Phil Sparks' Live Jazz Thursday at Barca on Capitol Hill stands out.

Each week for the past 10 years, Kessler and Sparks have hosted a different musician drawn from a who's who of Seattle jazz royalty, rounding out to form a stellar new trio each time. Live Jazz Thursday has developed its own special vibe and waves of devoted regulars. Kessler describes the sessions as a collaborative relationship:

"You'll see show after show, the same folks, almost as dedicated as the artists themselves. They make a real effort to be there. There is a real community at Thursday nights...Some still come every week, since the beginning 10 years ago. It really does feel like a collaboration – between the band, the audience, and definitely the staff."

Kessler gives kudos and credit to Barca, who have helped to nurture the scene. "They're so supportive, almost more than any other place I've played."

One enthusiastic regular is Tim O'Shea, who's been attending for about two years.

"I stumbled upon Barca's jazz night on a night that I was feeling low, and it picked me up right away," he says.

O'Shea notes that the format keeps it fresh. "I like watching those two [Kessler and Sparks] play every week with somebody else...It's fun to watch the relationship between these two guys, and then see how they play off of somebody new."

To mark this notable occasion of the 10-year anniversary, Kessler is putting together a compilation album of highlights from the sessions. *Live at Barca Vol. 1* will feature a slew of Seattle's finest, including Thomas Marriott, Alexey Nikolaev, Mark Taylor, Jay Thomas, Tim Kennedy, and many others. The album features 11 tracks recorded over the past year, and will be celebrated with an album release party on December 22 at Barca.

Underscoring the collaborative nature of the Live Jazz Thursday scene, Kessler has enlisted O'Shea, who is a

painter, to create album cover art from paintings made at Barca during the sessions. Another regular will be doing the graphic design, and Kessler is soliciting accompanying writings from other loyal patrons.

Kessler's notion of community plays out in other tangible ways too: All proceeds from sales will be donated to the Sanctuary Art Center, a local organization that provides a space for homeless youth to experience creativity and success through making art.

"I hope this project will be a way to use music and art to help folks that can't attend our Thursday nights, or go to the theater, or buy a CD," says Kessler. He considers music to be a "helping profession," and wants to serve others when he performs. "I'm looking for a way to use it to help folks that don't have those resources."

Seattle JazzED Debuts First WeBop Classes on the West Coast

"This is scat week," Tanesha Ross says to the three babies and their mothers perched on the colorful carpet in the middle of the MLK F.A.M.E. Community Center classroom in Madison Valley. Sixteen-month-old Parker shakes an avocado-shaped rattle, smiling shyly at Ross. Eleven-month-old Leo crawls in the direction of the drum set in the room where he heard a live drummer the week before.

To set up, Ross unfurls a few bars of "Oop Bop Sh'Bam," in an easy, soulful voice, then turns to the mothers. "What are some funny noises your kids make that we could scat with?"

When someone suggests a motor-like *bbbbb* sound, lips vibrating, Ross incorporates it handily on the next beat. As the rest of the group joins in, Ross leans down gently to look Leo in the eye.

"I see Leo scatting!" she says, watching his lips start to motor. He beams.

Welcome to WeBop, a jazz education program for children 8 months to 5 years, celebrating its West Coast debut at Seattle JazzED this fall.

Developed by New York City's renowned Jazz at Lincoln Center 12 years ago, WeBop's 45-minute classes are designed as a child-adult dyad, inviting participation from both parties.

"We have a great-grandma who brings a child, a stay-at-home dad, several nannies, and moms," says Kelly Barr Clingan, JazzED Education Director, of the organization's new We-Bop classes.

The curriculum is set up to help children "explore jazz through movement,

songs, storytelling and play," according to the Jazz at Lincoln Center website, and to provide both children and adults an opportunity to "learn about the core concepts, instruments, and great performers of jazz."

All WeBop classes run for eight-week terms with live jazz every week. Each class, the musician-instructor introduces a new jazz concept to the children and adults (scatting, improvisation, swing, etc.) through various songs and activities, accompanied by a live pianist. The curriculum follows the basic model of "feeling the concept, learning about the concept, applying the concept, then reinforcing it with a jam session," Clingan says. Weeks 4 and 8 are band weeks with jazz quartets that play throughout the

class, working through the curriculum with the teacher.

"One touch that makes it so different than other classes for kids is that it's not on CD; it's live music," Clingan says. "That's really special."

There are five WeBop classes available for different age groups: the Hipsters for kids 8-16 months (so-named because the young ones often perch at their adults' hips), the Scatters for kids 16-23 months, the Stompers for kids 2-3 years old, the Syncopators for kids 4-5 years old, and the Gumbo Group class for kids 2-5 years old. The last is the only WeBop class that is not set up as a dyad; adults are invited to bring multiple children in Gumbo Group classes.

Certain rituals happen each class, including the "Good Morning Blues"

song to start the day (in which the instructor sing-welcomes each child and adult by name); the "Shake/ Move" song in which children and adults are invited to shake rattles and tambourines and/or move their bodies until the music stops at the end of each verse; and the "Goodbye WeBop Friends" song to wrap things up (when each child and adult is again bid farewell by name). Each class also has a story-time in which a picture book is sung to students to a jazz tune, such as Margaret Wise Brown's Good Night Moon sung to the tune of John Coltrane's "Naima."

The live jazz, the chance for families to experiment with instruments together, and the personalized touches might be plenty to bring young families to WeBop. Still, there is more to this program for JazzED: the curriculum is grounded in research about early childhood development.

The "Shake/Move" portion of each class, for instance, "gives [kids'] inner sense of tempo an outlet," says Ross, who is licensed in Kindermusik and has a background in music theatre performance. "We actually start perceiving music in the womb. We can perceive rhythm almost immediately but just don't have the motor skills to express it."

She also points out the fact that repeating "Shake/Move" and other activities regularly throughout the eight-week term is intentional, since "kids need repetition." As groups are exposed to the same songs, stories, and activities multiple times, she points out that "throughout the weeks, you'll see changes in the way that they're using the instruments" and participating in familiar activities.

Furthermore, as Clingan puts it, the pedagogy itself "is jazz-like. When we think about jazz we think about creativity, expression and an improvisatory spirit. And that's how the teaching is. The kids are allowed pretty much any self expression."

Plus, Clingan continues, "As educators, we know that not all our students will go on to become professional musicians. Part of our job is to create lifelong music makers and music fans. I think this program really awakens that for these parents—maybe something they had forgotten they love, like live music—and shows them they can have that with their child."

WeBop parent Alisha Dall'osto, who attends the Hipsters class with her 11-month-old boy Leo, agrees.

"Adults have as much fun as the kids," she says.

Dall'osto adds that she and her husband (a guitarist and singer) wanted to surround their son with music they also like listening to.

"After the first [WeBop] class, I was sold. The teacher [Ross] is an incredible jazz musician—such a good voice, really good energy, and really engages the kids in ways that are innovative. She gets them going rhythmically, she surprises them in different ways," says Dall'osto. "We're learning new ways to engage musically with the baby. We've bought a lot of shakers!"

Winter WeBop classes will start the week of January 2, 2017 at JazzED, and be on Tuesdays and Saturdays. Registration is open now at www.se-attlejazzed.org/webop.

JazzED launched as a nonprofit in 2010 with the goal of providing kids with "great music education opportunities, regardless of what school they went to or how much money they had," according to its founder Laurie de Koch on the JazzED website. It started with two jazz ensembles that met weekly, and today serves 400 students through its numerous ensembles, masterclasses, summer program, vocal jazz, strings improv workshops, an allcity girls band, an annual Girls Jazz Day, and jam sessions. CLAP: New Music for the Briggan Krauss String & Reed Quartet

Saxophonist/ guitarist/ composer **Briggan Krauss** premieres his new project, CLAP, at the Chapel Performance Space on Friday, December 16, as part of Nonsequitur's Wayward Music Series. The quartet is Krauss on alto saxophone and electric guitar, **Wayne Horvitz** on keys, **Beth Fleenor** on clarinet and electronics, and **Greg Campbell** on percussion.

This project is an important milestone to Krauss, he says, as it formally brings his guitar playing and saxophone playing into the same musical context, and explores how these two instruments can coalesce and share the same orbit.

"I have always been primarily a saxophonist but my music took a dramatic turn about five years ago when I became obsessed with playing the guitar," he says. "Studying the guitar has changed the way I think about music in so many ways. It has allowed me to experience being a beginner at something again and to gain new perspectives on making music on an instrument that is in many ways completely opposite from the one I've dedicated my whole life to playing."

Taking up a completely new and different instrument, he continues, "is like planting a new seed.... It has brought me forward on so many musical fronts and I am truly inspired and passionate about continuing to see where this journey leads."

The work's title, "CLAP" originally came to Krauss as an acronym for "Clear, Loud as An order with Pauses," which, he says, is how first responders are trained to address others in an emergency.

"This form of communicating can help cut through panic by bringing

people back to the present and allowing them to take action," he says. "Simply clapping your hands can also be a way of bringing yourself to the present moment at a time when you might otherwise be overwhelmed by the chaos of everyday life."

28th Annual Concert of Duke Ellington's Sacred Music

Saturday, December 17, 7:30pm
Town Hall Seattle (1119 8th Ave) \$14-40

For the casual or newcomer jazz listener, the name Duke Ellington evokes images of fancy nightclubs, cocktail glasses clinking, the croon of a sexy singer and his signature swinging big band, composed of excellent musicians performing something along the lines of "It Don't Mean a Thing (If It Ain't Got That Swing)." The master Ellington (1899 to 1974), an early originator of the jazz big band and composer of 2,000 songs, took his band to excited audiences in all parts of the world, accomplishing 20,000 concerts in his 50 years as a music professional and introducing many jazz talents to the public.

But Duke Ellington also is known for his sacred music compositions. Deeply spiritual and decidedly nondenominational, his Sacred Concerts are intended to be performed in places of sanctuary, according to longtime Seattle jazz educator/musician, Clarence Acox.

This year's production of Duke Ellington's Sacred Concert will be held at 7:30pm, Saturday, December 17, at Town Hall. The full Seattle Repertory Jazz Orchestra (SRJO), with 17 instrumentalists, and the 20-voice choir of Northwest Chamber Chorus will be embellished by two masterful solo-

ists, Nichol Veneé Eskridge and Dr. Stephen Newby, as well as the exciting moves of finale tap dancer Alex Dugdale.

Acox, and SRJO co-director Michael Brockman, have taken part in the all-star annual concerts since 1988, initially as part of the Roadside Attraction big band. The role of producer, lovingly begun by Lara Morrison with support from the Interfaith Council of Seattle, was formally handed off to Earshot Jazz in 1993, keeping the chain unbroken for 28 years – so far. Acox refers to validation by The Duke Ellington Society in New York that, although concerts of this music are sporadically performed all over the

world, Seattle's jazz-rich community supports the singular, and longest running, annual Sacred Concert tradition.


The first composition and performance of the Sacred Concert was held at Grace Cathedral in San Francisco in 1965. The second was performed at Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City in 1968. The last concert, performed shortly before Ellington passed away of illness, was held at Westminster Abbey in London in 1973. The Seattle annual performance combines portions of all three of the Sacred Concerts.

Brockman, music professor at the University of Washington, is recognized as an Ellington scholar for his study, transcription, production and performance of this jazz master's music. As a graduate student at the New England Conser-

vatory of Music, Brockman and others transcribed the Sacred Concerts from the original recordings, and later augmented the fragmentary existing score left by Ellington. He says the early films and recordings, made with rudimentary equipment in large, high-ceilinged churches, are difficult to hear with clarity, "but of course the musicians were outstanding." Brockman feels that SRJO's CD recording of this music, performed in Seattle between 2001 and 2005, and featuring renowned singer Dee Daniels, remains

B'shnorkestra Global Concertos

Self-released

Trumpeter/composer Samantha Boshnack has produced an all-world music feast with her chamber orchestra B'shnorkestra, a 14-piece collective, formed in 2011, merging cross-cultural musicians from Seattle's many music communities. For B'shnorkestra's second new album *Global Concertos*, Boshnack spans out to five continents, composing five new concertos for five distinct soloists.

Under the direction of conductor Joshua Kohl, the project opens with a freedom song inviting the Hindustani vocals of Srivani Jade. Lyrically based on a visionary poem of a united world and spiritual unity, the musical landscape of "Prarthona" evolves to include modal transitions and melodic lines passed between instrumental voices.

"Concerto for Julio," written for Latin jazz piano master Julio Jáuregui, delves into ethereal harmonies and accelerando samba. Backed by wailing strings, Jauregui plays a transcendent solo before theme material develops into a spacey conclusion.

The third piece showcases the tradition of Greek clarinet, bringing the talents of Christos Govetas front and center of Boshnack's brilliant bluesinspired composition. "Concerto for Christos" weaves around an entrancing drone of bass and cello, pizzicato texture, and open horn harmonies, before Govetas leads the band into an illustrious and contemplative celebration.

The rhythmic intensity of the album peaks with "Concerto for Talking Drum," featuring West African talking drum by Thione Diop, descendant from an ancestral line of Griot drummers from Senegal. Here, Boshnack leads strong trumpet and saxophone lines inspired by African jazz. Diop's expressive soloing and sheer virtuosity fuel the high-energy piece.

Concluding the album is Boshnack's stellar jazz trumpet concerto featuring the prolific Thomas Marriott. Timeless harmonies abound, and atop them Marriott sends chills with upper register lines and expressive phrasing all his own.

A sense of boundless – and borderless – creative improvisation infuses Boshnack's cinematic compositions; her musical feat cannot be overlooked or overplayed.

The Kareem Kandi Band Hourglass

Self-released

Saxophonist Kareem Kandi – Northwest favorite and a key figure in Taco-

ma's jazz scene – is known for his classic tones and straight-ahead approach. When joined by the rich harmonies of B3 organist Delvon Lamarr and the rhythmic punctuations of D'Vonne Lewis, a be-bop soul force is born.

A versatile jazz/funk trio, The Kareem Kandi Band has self-released a new album *Hourglass*, a balance of three originals and three remakes of popular standards (John Coltrane's "Impressions," Hoagy Carmichael's "Stardust," and Josef Myrow's "You Make Me Feel So Young.")

The boys come out of the gate with a juicy, funk-filled version of "Impressions," as if Coltrane were to have combined visions with Reuben Wilson. By the third track "Curvaceous," they've channeled a more playful, R&B spirit.

The group embraces mellow vibes on both the killer rendition of "Stardust" and "Hourglass." Kandi's warm tone sings the timeless melody of "Stardust," and Lamarr adds a fresh spin with lush organ chords. On their title track, Lewis mesmerizes with snare rolls and a Latin-influenced groove.

"Guess Again" is a tight funk anthem the group has been performing together since last summer (including



a feature on KNKX radio), making for a rock-solid and memorable recording. Kandi's soulful riffs are perfectly balanced by Lamarr's slick basslines. A noteworthy bridge blends into a buttery organ solo, where Lamarr is complemented by Lewis' gregarious interplay.

The band brings it home with their swinging up-tempo version of "You Make Me Feel So Young," twice Myrow's original tempo. The trio more than proves themselves of their topnotch be-bop abilities, all the while playing with ease and an unteachable chemistry.



Gregg Belisle-Chi

I Sang to You and the Moon

Self-released

Guitarist and composer Gregg Belisle-Chi has emerged as one of the Northwest's most creatively dexterous musicians, intuitively spanning varied scenes from improvisational chamber music to the experimental edge of pop/ rock songwriting. Informed by jazz but evading direct connections and conventions, Belisle-Chi's work shares some sonic and conceptual territory with his own recent work in Andy



Clausen's Shutter Project as well as occasional mentor Bill Frisell.

Belisle-Chi's superb new album, *I* Sang to You and the Moon, builds on elements he began to explore in his 2015 debut, *Tenebrae*: a literary and harmonically sophisticated, almost spiritual approach to songwriting. Both albums share a patient, ethereal quality, but *Tenebrae* occupied a more somber and austere space, while the new album dwells in more warmly earthy realms.

Belisle-Chi's new compositions are set to the words of iconic American poet (and folk singer) Carl Sandburg. The music explores approachable tonalities and melodies while following the contours of the words and their own peculiarly winding logic. The songs are uniformly beautiful, powerful, and memorable, whether exploring more eerie suite-like cinematic moods ("Dream Girl") or elemental heartland trance ("Bringers"). There is something inherently powerful about a technically skilled and ambitious composer/musician applying his efforts to focusing and simplifying, as I Sang to You and the Moon poetically demonstrates.

The guitar-centered forms are embroidered with superbly sensitive collaborator contributions: Chelsea Crabtree's powerful and intimate yet otherworldly vocals, Carmen Rothwell's woody bass (channeling a bit of the spirit of Charlie Haden), and Raymond Larsen's smeary, poignant trumpet.

Josh Rawlings Trio Swell

Self-released

Emerging from the improvisational depths of the Green Leaf, the Josh Rawlings Trio, featuring Adam Kes-

sler on drums and Nate Omdal on upright bass, recently released their new album *Swell*. Keyboardist Rawlings' playful compositions, creative arrangements, and curatorial skills provide a light-hearted sonosphere packed with talented guests artists.

The secret sauce of the trio is perhaps their ability to steadily transition in and out of multi-genre inspired grooves resulting in layers of subtle sonic variation. Their song selection and pacing make *Swell* one of the most listenable records I've heard this year.

In a nod to West Coast cool jazz legend, Rawlings sings original lyrics to the classic Paul Desmond "Take Five." His compositions "Alone" and "Seatown Swing" feature Gabriel Burbano on the trumpet providing his characteristically soulful, even wistful touch. Isabella Du Graf's sweet coos are ear candy in the upbeat composition "You Are The Reason," while Jessie Sawyers' rhythmic dancing cruises forward on "Wave." Rawlings also reveals a more personal side singing together with his wife Emily in a sentimental ode to his daughter "Freja."

Swell also features several popular songs including Stevie Wonder's "Pastime Paradise," Weezer's "Undone" and "Say It Ain't So," and a Seattle favorite, Nirvana's "Smells Like Teen Spirit." Rawlings delivers his cool and dark textures for these covers a la Ethan Iverson (The Bad Plus).



the best recorded version of the repertoire.

Fifty-one years since the first Sacred Concert, what is the significance of this art work to the Seattle region, and beyond?

"It's the most beautiful music that Ellington wrote," Acox asserts. "It's so spiritual and gorgeously arranged and it meant so much to Ellington."

He adds that the composer insisted that the work should be performed in a sacred, but nondenominational, setting. Beyond that, Acox, who is also the director of Garfield High School's award-winning jazz band, says this work is meaningful for the Black community because of its reflection of the dignity, talent, and sophistication of Ellington, but also due to the incorporation of gospel overtones, work songs and the tap dance sequence.

"It's ecumenical and also universal," Brockman adds. "It was significant when it was first performed in a turbulent political time in San Francisco, and it is significant here and now."


