Jazz: The Second Century

Deadline June 1

Earshot Jazz seeks submissions from Seattle-area individual artists and ensembles for the 2017 Jazz: The Second Century series. The series brings the progression of jazz into creative motion on the concert stage. Projects that question and expand the conventions of the jazz form are welcome.

Seattle-area individual artists or groups, in any instrument combination, are eligible. Submissions must include a recorded sample of a project that can be performed in a concert setting. We encourage applicants to include a letter that speaks to their musical interpretation of the meaning of jazz and of the next stage of jazz music.

Individual artists or ensembles are selected by a blind-jury process. Second Century artists and ensembles perform during July 2017, and are paid a competitive fee for the performance.

4Culture Project Grants

The deadlines to apply for a 4Culture Project grant in Arts, Heritage, and Preservation have been set. Grants are available to artists and art groups, residing in King County, who are creating and presenting work in dance, theater, music, media, literature, and the visual arts. The Arts Projects deadline for individuals and groups is March 1. More at 4culture.org.

CMA New Jazz Works Grant

Chamber Music America's New Jazz Works program supports the creation of new works by professional US-based jazz artists (with CMA Organizationlevel membership). The grants ask US

jazz ensembles to create, perform, and if desired, record new works. Funding is supported by the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation. Deadline is March **5**. More at chamber-music.org.

5th Annual Jazz Contest for Women Composers

Seattle Women's Jazz Orchestra (SWOJO) is now seeking submissions for its fifth annual composition contest, this year a drum feature. The winning compositions will be performed and recorded live by SWOJO with special guest Sherrie Maricle of DIVA. Submission deadline is **June 18**.

The contest was created to encourage the composition and performance of the highest quality jazz ensemble literature playable by high school, college, and professional bands alike. This project is supported in part by Seattle Office of Arts & Culture, 4Culture, and the Seattle Foundation.

IN ONE EAR

Jim Knapp Retires from Cornish

Longtime music professor Jim Knapp recently retired from Cornish College of the Arts, aptly celebrating with a performance of his Scrape project, an original music string orchestra with guitar and harp.

Jazz has been taught at Cornish College of the Arts since the 1960s, but came into its own when a young trumpeter named Jim Knapp "codified the program as we know it now," in words of tribute from departmental colleague Chuck Deardorf. It's been the better part of 50 years since then, and because of Knapp's pioneering work, Jazz at Cornish has national stature.

A Chicago native, Knapp attended the University of Illinois, from which he received both a Bachelor of Arts and a master's degree. He has served as director of The Composers and Improvisors Orchestra and has led various small jazz groups, including Scrape, originally with Eyvind Kang '93, and the Jim Knapp Orchestra.

Knapp was for years the program head of Jazz within the Cornish Music Department. Among his awards are a National Endowment for the Arts Jazz Composition Fellowship, a Seattle Arts Commission Individual Artist Music Composition grant, and support from Meet the Composer and Artist Trust. In November 2006, he was honored by Cornish for "35 Years of Jazz." In 2007, he was inducted into the Earshot Jazz Hall of Fame, and in 2010 received the "Certificate of Excellence in Teaching" for 2009-2010 from Cornish College of the Arts.

Knapp has recorded as a composer and/or performer on the ECM, A-Records, Origin, Pony Boy, Seabreeze, Flying Fish, Catalyst, and Mode record labels.

Brian Monroney: Vibe, Ambience & Elevating the Music

When a particularly spectacular talent arrives on a scene, it's usually other musicians who catch on first, and excitedly spread the word amongst themselves in hushed, reverent tones. The last few years, these words have often been about guitarist Brian Monroney.

Drummer and bandleader Tarik Abouzied describes Monroney as "a local treasure," and calls him "one of those players whose breadth of knowledge and experience is crystal clear the moment you hear him. He's armed with all the chops anyone could want but has the taste and restraint necessary to contribute to the music wisely."

Ace pianist Bill Anschell described Monroney as "very humble and focused, trying to make the best musical decision at any given moment; no ego getting in the way. And he's really well-rounded."

Brazilian singer and scene-maker Adriana Giordano calls Monroney the "utmost professional when it comes to organization, dedication, and reliability, but it's also evident how much he enjoys making music."

Monroney himself makes his mission sound simple: "I've always prided myself on being someone who can fit into any musical situation and make it a little better, a little richer, create some vibe and some ambience, and support the singer or whoever the focal point is."

It's a typically modest statement from a musician who has in fact spent many years of focused work honing his craft as a sideman across a dizzying range of musical styles. The Colorado-raised

Monroney established himself initially in the Latin music hotbed of Miami and spent many years in and out of LA, logging time with superstars such as Natalie Cole and Gloria Estefan and appearing on television and on numerous film soundtracks.

Whether live or in the studio, Monroney works his supportive magic without undue flash or fanfare, subtly elevating and enriching the music. When called on to solo, he can unleash explosively serpentine lines rich with inner logic and compositional substance. Monroney inhabits the best of both worlds: the work ethic, experience, and taste of a seasoned pro, coupled with the enthusiasm, energy, and joy of a true music lover.

Like many a true sideman, Monroney is as good a listener as a talker, and humbly peppers his conversation with admiration for all the other musicians he has connected with since his arrival in Seattle.

"People have been pretty welcoming, despite the reputation of the Seattle Freeze," he laughs. "I sat in at Capitol Cider a few times, and started getting calls for gigs....When I first got here, I thought I was just going to be really focused on recording."

Seattle has reinvigorated his love of live performance.

"I'm having a blast," says Monroney with a smile.

Monroney is adept at and open to a huge range of styles of music, and his longest running gig (over 17 years) was as guitarist/musical director for the global icon Tom Jones. Though pop music often conjures notions of superficiality, professional musicians and astute listeners know that most pro "pop" bands are packed with some of the world's finest, most versatile musi-

cians, with deep reserves of creativity that can be deftly applied to any genre.

Of his time with Jones, Monroney remarks, "It was a great job! It was a lot of fun. I got to see the world, I got to play with great musicians, and he is a powerhouse performer."

Since his arrival in Seattle in late 2012, a big part of his focus has been the local jazz scene, and he grew up as far more of a jazz fan than a rocker.

"It was always something I loved, but I never have considered myself a jazz player seriously, in terms of really knowing the whole canon of all the standards," he says. "All along, I was a sideman, a hired gun – sessions, tours, etc., mostly pop music....Jerk of all trades, master of none!" [Laughs.]

Monroney's joke obscures the fact that many of our greatest musicians are omnivorous music-lovers rather than doctrinaire, dogmatic genre ideologues.

As Anschell notes, "Jazz is just part of what he does, and as a consequence he probably hasn't gotten the attention he deserves from the jazz world."

Monroney's approach towards jazz standards is one of reverence without undue adulation – a respect for the living tradition.

"I think there are ways to interpret them that keep them fresh, without mangling them. You can go overboard and totally re-harmonize them and put them in weird meters, and nobody recognizes them." He doesn't simply want to make music for musicians. "You have to try and connect with people."

Whereas many young musicians may push themselves to lead bands and perform original music long before they're truly ready, Monroney might be the opposite case: his skills and concepts are so well-seasoned that he's overdue for a solo effort. Luckily, he has plans to document his original music. He's been workshopping compositions with a quartet in Tacoma that includes bassist Chris Symer, saxophonist Pete Gallio, and drummer Dave Snodgrass.

"I'm starting to have a body of tunes that I think I should record," he says. "Part of it may be just documenting the quartet down in Tacoma."

Monroney describes the music as challenging and complex. "I try not be, but I just gravitate towards lots of chords. And weird meters." [Laughs.]

Monroney leaves a parting shoutout to the fellow musical travelers of the Pacific Northwest: "I really admire the people out there like we've talked about, people in this community who are out playing every night, and being really positive."

Catching Up With: James Falzone

Newly appointed Chair of Music at Cornish College of the Arts, multigenre clarinetist, and award-winning composer James Falzone wears all the hats, all the time. Falzone feels it's essential to invest himself in his new community, regularly attending local jams, playing with groups including Wayne Horvitz's Electric Circus, and creating with improvisational collaborations, including an upcoming Wayward Music Series performance on March 2 with percussionist Bonnie Whiting.

It's been less than a half year ago since Falzone moved his family here from Chicago, where, for nearly a decade and a half, he had been a crucial part of the local jazz and improvised music scene. The Midwest still holds several spring gigs for Falzone: his Arabic-infused Allos Musica Ensemble will reunite in April; his new project

Wayfaring with Chicago bassist/vocalist Katie Ernst plans to release their record this September; a stunning performance pairing Falzone's compositions with non-disabled dancers and dancers with disabilities tours to St. Louis in May, following its November Chicago debut.

He warmly tells me all this between stormy downpours one afternoon in Capitol Hill, where he also shares how his instrument has allowed him versatility, how he plans to help shape modern musicians, and the importance of showing up:

You've called the clarinet "a conduit, though a fascinating one." What has mastering this instrument brought your career?

It's not a very old instrument, invented in the late 18th century. In New Orleans, when musicians were beginning to play what we now recognize as jazz, there were clarinets and cornets and

drums lying around sort of left over from the marching band period. The instrument has this glorious history in early jazz and swing, but bebop just killed it. It gets a resurgence in the free jazz era with musicians like Eric Dolphy, John Carter, and Jimmy Giuffre.

And that's where I step back into it. I fell in love with it as a kid, for no particular reason... I have an uncle who is a film composer and fine woodwinds player, and he gave me my first lessons. I quickly realized that the instrument was incredibly versatile. From a young age, I was interested in a lot of types of music – I could study classical, jazz, and world music traditions, or listen to Klezmer, Arabic, and Turkish music, [and it would translate] to the clarinet in ways it wouldn't with other instruments.

So, that's what I based my whole career around: exploring the clarinet and my musical interests through a very facile instrument. That said, I've

said it's just a conduit, because if for some reason I couldn't play it, I would switch instruments. Music – and my level of interest in music – is far greater than the clarinet.

You had a plateful in Chicago, including a 15-year collegiate education history, and various roles as a musician. Have you been able to consolidate your energies in Seattle as you had hoped?

It's interesting how much of my background my position at Cornish brings together. I've taught pretty much everything you can teach in music – composition, world music, clarinet, jazz history, theory – and now I'm overseeing people who are teaching those things, so I totally know what they're going through. I have been able to consolidate which feels really good.

That said, I'm the kind of person who thrives on not just doing one thing. I'm also playing a lot and working on projects outside of Cornish. All these things that I've been doing have focused in on my position, but a big part of what I offer this position is that I have such a wide purview and am a working artist and know what it means to be a working musician presently.

One of your current tasks at Cornish is to assess the program and make sure it's meeting the needs of a 21st-century musician. What do you want to see happen?

Music schools have become very genre-focused. My observation about 21st-century music making is that most genres are obliterated as a working musician. What you're expected to do, is to do everything. And to do everything well, and even on the same gig perhaps do everything!

I was performing Wayne Horvitz's music the other night; you had to read, improvise, be able to play very classically oriented, be able to swing, and there were elements that were world music-esque where you had to play in a certain kind of groove. It asked the musicians to do an incredible variety of things.

So, I would like to see Cornish deemphasize genre. That doesn't mean we don't study jazz or classical music, but that we don't pigeonhole students.


Jazz has always been an open container. Rather than funnel students, let's bring them in wide and keep them wide. Cornish has always done that, but I think we can achieve this in a curricular way by setting up the program and classes one takes to incorporate these ways of thinking.

Is there advice you give to young musicians navigating when to take on opportunities and when to say "no"?

School should not be about career. School is a time for craftsmanship, and that takes time and work, especially in the early years. I think there is a place for any school to be talking about making a living as a working artist in contemporary society, no doubt. But I would rather stop educating if I'm sending musicians into the world who know how to make great press releases, but can't play, feel, and think.

Going against some contemporary trends in education, I want to find the ability for our students to be more contemplative. We'll give them tools and help them connect, but the truth is those skills really come when you're out there. I can tell you about what you should do to get a gig, but I get

gigs in the weirdest ways possible and very rarely in the way I tell students to. Great artists have a way of finding work, and I'm interested in Cornish being a place that makes great musical artists.

You and UW Chair of Percussion Bonnie Whiting opened the Improvised Music Festival together the first weekend of February. What can we expect from your and Whiting's concert March 2 at the Chapel?

Several years ago, Bonnie and I were connected through a mutual friend, but we didn't meet personally until this past September at the Seattle New Music Happy Hour. She had just started her position at UW, and we bonded over being new to town.

What we'll do together in March will

be all improvised. She'll do solo pieces that have either been written for her or she has worked up. I'm going to be doing some solo playing, and a piece for six clarinets and saxophones, part of my project "Renga Music," which is a form of collaborative Japanese poetry. That will feature several local clarinet/saxophone players that I've been meeting through playing around town at Vermillion, Racer series, and places I've been going to hear music.

With sips left of espresso and some crumbs of nut bread on his plate, Falzone narrated a few personal stories all illustrating his mantra of being a part of the music around you. He resembled the professor from his past in

one of the hundreds of undergraduate lessons he's taught.

"When I was nineteen or twenty and becoming full of myself as you do at that age, my dad and I were walking in a Borders Books," he tells me. "There

was this awful saxophone player playing with a very bad pianist in the corner café on a Friday night. I remember commenting, 'This is terrible,' and my dad said, 'Yea, but they are playing a gig, and you're walking around Borders with your dad.''

Falzone laughs that

Falzone laughs that this parental truth encouraged him to scramble and get gigs for himself. Equally, it instilled the importance of being around live music of every medium.

"I'm interested in building and supporting the local community – from large organizations

playing concert music to the biggest audiences, to the funky club down five flights of stairs where someone's playing solo oboe with a balloon on their head and five people are in attendance," he says. "There are all kinds of reasons to experience live music. Each and every one is a chance to grow."

Miguel Zenón Quartet with Luis Perdomo, Hans Glawischnig & Henry Cole Wednesday, March 1, 8pm PONCHO Concert Hall

Internationally acclaimed saxophonist/composer **Miguel Zenón** celebrates the release of his new recording, *Tipico*, his tenth as a leader. Joining Zenón are his long-time bandmates who are also featured on the recording: pianist **Luis Perdomo**, bassist **Hans Glawischnig**, and drummer **Henry Cole**.

A multiple Grammy nominee and Guggenheim and MacArthur Fellow, Zenón is one of a select group of musicians who have masterfully balanced and blended the often-contradictory poles of innovation and tradition. Widely considered one of the most groundbreaking and influential saxophonists of his generation, Zenón has also developed a unique voice as a composer and as a conceptualist, concentrating his efforts on perfecting a fine mix between Latin American folkloric music and jazz. Born and raised in Puerto Rico, Zenón has recorded and toured with a wide variety of musicians including Charlie Haden, Fred Hersch, and Kenny Werner, and is a founding member of the SFJAZZ Collective.

Típico is above all a celebration of Zenón's longstanding quartet. Its focus stays closer to home, with nods to Zenón's own personal and professional life as it zeroes in on what makes his band unique.

"I was thinking about what this band and the guys in the band mean to me as I was writing the music," he explains. "I kept going back to this idea of us developing this common language that identifies us as a band." That language has been developing for more than a decade. Perdomo and Glawischnig have been with Zenón since the turn of the millennium; Cole joined the band in 2005. Their language is thoroughly fluent modern jazz, with all the instrumental prowess and rhythmic and harmonic complex-

Ryan Keherle's Catharsis Monday, March 13, 8:30pm The Royal Room

Here is a decidedly original band you will not want to miss. Pacific Northwest native. New York-based trombonist/composer Ryan Keberle leads his bold, piano-less quintet, Catharsis, featuring music from their current, Grammy-nominated record Azul Infinito, which was listed as one of "5 New Jazz Albums You Need to Check Out" by Billboard magazine. Keberle has played alongside masters of a multitude of forms, from jazz greats Maria Schneider and Wynton Marsalis to indie rock groundbreakers Sufjan Stevens and St. Vincent, R&B superstars Beyoncé and Alicia Keys, and classical virtuosos.

Keberle's compositions on *Azul Infinito* were inspired by time spent performing with brilliant South American composers Pedro Giraudo, Sebastian Cruz, Samuel Torres, Ivan Lins, and Emilio Solla.

His work is rich in captivating grooves, melodic invention, and group interaction, expressing conscious awareness of the universal language of music, and the emotional power that great music holds on its listeners.

Catharsis is comprised of the primarily word-less vocals of Chilean singer Camila Meza, which mesh seamlessly with the tenor sax of **Scott Robinson**, bass of Peruvian-born Jorge Roeder, and drums of Eric Doob. The band brings an impressive wealth of experience and musicianship, playing an integral role in many of the top jazz and Latin jazz ensembles, including the bands of Charlie Haden, Gary Burton, Julian Lage, Christian Scott, Paquito D'Rivera, and Gonzalo Rubalcaba. As an ensemble, they create a unique continuity resulting from their constant collaboration over the past four years. Described by the Los Angeles Times as

New York-based Ben Allison has gained international renown in a career spanning three decades, and has established himself as a leading voice of his generation. As a bassist and composer, he has developed a distinct style of jazz that incorporates rock, folk, and funk conventions. His own work spans 11 albums, seven of which have reached the top of the CMJ jazz radio charts, and he has collaborated with a diverse range of artists, often from backgrounds outside jazz. Allison is also a notable activist for the cause of musicians as the founder of the musician-run, non-profit organization Jazz Composers Collective and as President of the New York chapter of the Recording Academy.

Allison performs in Seattle with his group Think Free, with guitarist Steve Cardenas, trumpeter Kirk Knuffke, and drummer Allan Mednard. Steve Cardenas has spent over 20 years as a guitarist in New York, demonstrating his skill in his craft through works such as his 2014 album Melody in a Dream. Kirk Knuffke, who recently performed with Michael Bisio at the 2016 Earshot Jazz Festival, has also become a fixture in New York, and has been nominated Trumpeter of the Year by the Jazz Journalist Association. Allan Mednard has played with many jazz greats in his time, including Aaron Parks and Kurt Rosenwinkel. The quartet will be playing new music from its recently recorded album, as well as tunes from previous albums.

The 2017 DeMiero Jazz Festival runs Friday, March 3, and Saturday, March 4, at the Edmonds Center for the Arts. Now in its 41st year, the non-competitive vocal jazz festival features an all-star lineup of regional vocalists in evening performances, as well as over 60 school and community jazz choirs during the daytime festival.

Attendees can observe the future of vocal jazz as students from elementary, high school, college, and community choirs work with world-class professionals during the two days of clinics, workshops, and master classes. These daytime events are free to the public and are held at the Edmonds Center for the Arts and the North Sound Community Church.

World-class professional guest artists include renowned song stylist **Dee Daniels**, vocalist, pianist, and composer **John Proulx**, and the **True North** jazz quartet, backed up by the All-Star Jazz Festival Band of Bruce Forman, Dwayne Broadnax, Josh Nelson, and Paul Beaudry. Local favorite jazz choirs Soundsation and the Seattle Jazz Singers will also perform during the evening concerts.

Dee Daniels has been part of the local jazz scene since the late 1970s, where she frequently performed at Edmonds Community College, Soundsation Jazz Camp, and the DeMiero Jazz Festival. A favorite of students and directors, she was frequently requested back because of her passion, caring,

and devotion. She now serves as the Artistic Director for the DeMiero Jazz Fest.

The festival welcomes singer, pianist, and composer John Proulx as a featured guest artist. Smooth and swinging, Proulx has performed with artists including Anita O'Day, Natalie Cole, and Marian McPartland. In 2006,

he won a Grammy as a co-writer on Nancy Wilson's *Turned to Blue* record. Born in Michigan, Proulx studied in Chicago before moving to Los Angeles in 2001, where he's emerged as a young talent on the jazz scene.

True North is a vocal ensemble encompassing a wide range of musical influences and backgrounds that seeks

to find the balance between jazz, funk, pop, and R&B. Together, the four singers – Katie Campbell, Sharmila G. Lash, Fletcher Sheridan, and Matt Falker – have experience in songwriting, arranging, touring, session singing, choral singing, and teaching. True North have been featured artists at Northwest College Jazz Festival in

Wyoming and the Cuesta College Jazz Festival in California, and have performed at Los Angeles' esteemed jazz club, bluewhale, in addition to various venues throughout northern and southern California.

Two scholarship winners will also be featured at the festival.

Artistic Director Dee Daniels announced 18-year-old jazz singer Josh Tazman as the first Dee Daniels Scholarship winner. Guest artists will mentor Tazman during the festival, and he will be featured during the evening concerts. Already an accomplished pianist, vocalist, and composer, Tazman can scat bebop and deliver mature and subtle versions of classics. He recently won the 2016 DownBeat Student Award for a vocal jazz solo, and has appeared with numerous artists and groups.

The Tim Hauser scholarship, established in the memory of the founder of the Manhattan Transfer, offers a special choir free registration for the festival. This year's winner is a delightfully serious and committed group — Sonia Sarr's fifth and sixth grade jazz choir from Evangel Classical School in Marysville, Washington.

Evening concerts start at 7pm both nights at the Edmonds Center for the Arts. Tickets are \$25 for students and \$35 for adults, and are available at edmondscenterforthearts.org.


