By now, we all know that April is Jazz Appreciation Month (IAM). We also know that our new president proposed has the elimination of the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for Humanities. and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting,



while building new walls around the country and greatly increasing military budgets to defend them. We're beginning to see just how much of a "jam" we're in.

This year, we're asking you to take JAM two steps further. Let's make it Jazz Appreciation, Advocacy, and Action Month. It's time to get intentional about preserving and supporting America's cultural treasures.

Last year's Jazz Appreciation Month culminated in the hippest International Jazz Day ever, with our hippest president ever opening the White House (which he renamed the Blues House) to an incredible concert by many of the top names in jazz. And, over and above the great music, what resonated most for many of us was the natural prestige in which jazz was cast, and the elegance and respect with which Barack Obama spoke of "America's great gift to the world," saying that,

"Jazz is the ultimate in rugged individualism and the truest expression of community."

Those days appear to be over. While Presi-Barack dent Obama said. "Jazz is fearless and true," and quoted Duke Ellington in referring to jazz as our best "barometer of free-

dom," our new president equates the vast personal fortunes of the few as barometers of freedom and projects fearlessness by dramatic increases in military might, at the risk of personal liberties and cultural values.

Jazz reminds us all to remember our role in the American experiment: a government "of the people, by the people, and for the people." All of the people. And we are asking you to join us in making direct contact with our elected officials to express our concerns and to save the NEA, NEH, CPB, and to preserve those aspects of our own government that reflect all of the cultures it represents. Your voice is part of the band. Let's get in tune and make some noise.

Earshot Jazz seeks submissions from Seattle-area individual artists and ensembles for the 2017 Jazz: The Second Century series. The series brings the progression of jazz into creative motion on the concert stage. Projects that question and expand the conventions of the jazz form are welcome.

Seattle-area individual artists or groups, in any instrument combination, are eligible. Submissions must include a recorded sample of a project that can be performed in a concert setting. We encourage applicants to include a letter that speaks to their musical interpretation of the meaning of jazz and of the next stage of jazz music.

Individual artists or ensembles are selected by a blind-jury process. Second Century artists and ensembles perform during July 2017, and are paid a competitive fee for the performance.

#### Café Racer to be Sold

Café Racer owner Kurt Geissl recently announced he will be putting the beloved bar/restaurant/venue up for sale, citing "increasing concerns with family, responsibilities in [his] full-time 'second,' job and the desire to do other things [that] contributed to this decision" on the café's Facebook page.

Café Racer has become a mainstay on Seattle's music scene, as the host

to the weekly Racer Sessions and performances by La Luz, Country Lips, Ravenna Woods, Lonesome Shack, and more. It is also the meeting space for a variety of clubs and social organizations.

"I never really knew what Café Racer meant to people until after the tragic shooting [in 2012]," Geissl said. "The outpouring of love and support from the community was amazing and the fact that we, as a community were able to come back from it shows that there is a need for places like Café Racer in the world.

"My dream is that someone would like to keep the café going in the same manner as it has been for the last twelve years. The community deserves it."

The current president recently unveiled his proposed budget for the 2018 fiscal year, in which there were glaring cuts to programs that are crucial to a thriving so-

Proposed budget for defense spending? \$640 billion.

Proposed budget for arts and cultural agencies? A whopping \$0.

The current administration's plans would cut four cultural agencies and their collective \$971 million budgets. That's just .0015% of the defense budget.

It is extremely worrisome that the current administration wants to suppress one of the most vital pillars in our democracy.

In justifying the \$54 billion increase in defense spending, the current president says: "These cuts are sensible and rational. Every agency and department will be driven to achieve greater efficiency and to eliminate wasteful spending."

Now let's go back to 1965, as President Lyndon B. Johnson signs into effect the National Endowment for the Arts: "Art is a nation's most precious heritage. For it is in our works of art that we reveal to ourselves, and to others, the inner vision which guides us as a Nation. And where there is no vision, the people perish."

Our current president is not putting America First.

When the arts come under attack, so does the freedom of expression; when the arts are no longer valued, neither is individual thought. The arts have the power to question and captivate, diversify and educate, excite and celebrate. It is through the arts that communities grow and flourish.

The NEA is vital to America's culture, and so, dear readers, I implore you to take action now. We must prove to our current president and Congress that the arts are not "wasteful." We must ensure the longevity of our thriving society, which values freedom of expression.

- Contact your representatives and let them know the president and his administration must not cut funding to the National Endowment for the Arts.
- Contact your friends and family members in other states and encourage them to contact their representatives.
- Encourage your social media networks to engage their lawmakers through Twitter and Facebook posts by using #SavetheNEA.
- Have open, honest conversations with your community about what matters to you, and be sure to seek out and listen to other viewpoints.

Remember that the arts are part of a great society.


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## 2016 GOLDEN EAR AWARDS CEREMONY

Last month at The Royal Room, a full house of artists and audiences alike gathered to celebrate recent accomplishments by Seattle's jazz community. Opening the night was the 200 Trio (Cole Schuster, guitar; Greg Feingold, bass; Max Holmberg, drums), who delivered a tight, attention-grabbing set of standards and original compositions.

Jim Wilke, host of the nationally syndicated Jazz Northwest program, emceed the presentation of the Golden Ear Awards. In a night honoring current achievements in Seattle jazz, those in attendance were also treated to a celebration of the legacies of Julian Priester and Jim Knapp, who were each recognized for their remarkable careers. The evening also brought to light the importance of jazz, creativity, and art in today's changing landscape, with speeches by award recipients and presenters.

We congratulate all the nominees in this annual look at the region's vibrant and thriving jazz ecology.

# **NW Recording of the Year**Birch Pereira & The Gin Joints, *Dream Man*

"Over the years (and decades), there have been recurring cycles of popularity for many varieties of traditional country, early rock & roll, and 'retroswing,' sometimes driven as much by fashion as by sound musical intent. Birch Pereira and The Gin Joints however, are clearly not about shtick, gimmicks, or ironic detachment. This is a top-shelf unit of superb musicians, and on their new album *Dream Man*, they explore a keenly curated repertoire of classic sounds, steeped with an obvious affinity and love for the music.

Birch Pereira is an almost eerily versatile bassist, arranger, and singer, as seemingly at home with the electronic beats and synth textures of his band Theoretics as he is wandering the dusty roads of American vernacular music with The Gin Joints. It's a fairly rare upright bass player who can sing great lead vocals while laying down a locked-in groove, but Pereira makes it sound easy. His high tenor is delicate but authoritative, and always in the


pocket, and the stripped-down but superbly effective arrangements are spot on.

Able to blend Willie Dixon, Hank Williams, Fats Waller, and much more into a single tasty brew, The Gin Joints obviously have a distinctive skill at deftly exploring the sometimes treacherous seams between country, swing and the roadhouse, while finding the timeless essence of great songs from any era." (*Earshot Jazz*, June 2016)

#### **NW Concert of the Year**

LineUp! featuring Julian Priester, Ballard Jazz Festival May 13, New York Fashion Academy

Saxophonist Mark Taylor and pianist (and 2015 Northwest Instrumentalist of the Year) Dawn Clement recently launched a new ensemble that has delighted audiences, particularly in a memorable performance at the 2016 Ballard Jazz Festival. The two awardwinning Pacific Northwest artists bring listeners a lineup of new, collaborative compositions, and, in this Concert of the Year, performed with

drummer D'Vonne Lewis, bassist Michael Glynn, and special guest, trombonist Julian Priester.

Mark Taylor is a creative improviser and impeccable ensemble player. He performs and records with Matt Jorgensen +451, Jim Knapp Orchestra, Tom Varner, Thomas Marriott, Wayne Horvitz, Seattle Repertory Jazz Orchestra, and the Randy Halberstadt Quintet. Taylor has two acclaimed Origin Records releases: *After Hours* (2002) and *Spectre* (2009).

Dawn Clement began playing piano when she was 10 years old, with early lessons with ragtime pianist and church organist Keith Taylor. Her career today includes playing at the Mary Lou Williams Piano Competition at Washington DC's Kennedy Center and Paris' International Martial Solal Jazz Piano Competition, teaching at Cornish and at Port Townsend's Centrum Jazz Workshop, and releasing five CDs.

Julian Priester is a celebrated musician who played with Max Roach, Duke Ellington, John Coltrane, Herbie Hancock, and many others before a long teaching career at Cornish College of the Arts.

# NW Acoustic Jazz Ensemble Anton Schwartz Quintet

Splitting his time between San Francisco and Seattle, saxophonist/composer/educator Anton Schwartz has become a significant force on the West Coast. With critically acclaimed releases, including 2014's Flash Mob, which spent eight weeks in jazz radio's Top 10 and earned a four-star review in DownBeat magazine, Schwartz has reinforced his reputation as a passionate but poised improviser and smart purveyor of captivating melodies. His impeccable quintet sees a rotating lineup of musicians, with Pacific

Northwest regulars including bassist Michael Glynn, pianist Randy Porter, and drummer Matt Jorgensen, who joined Schwartz and vocalist Denise Donatelli in a successful outing at the 2016 Earshot Jazz Festival.

### **NW Alternative Jazz Group** Happy Orchestra

"A phenomenally funky drummer, with taste, feel, and chops to spare, Abouzied elevates every band he's a part of, providing gems for breakbeat hunters for years to come....With humor and humility, he achieves a deft balance, exploring the technical and intellectual challenges in music while still forging a deep emotional connection with the audience" (*Earshot Jazz*, November 2016).

Tarik Abouzied's aptly named Happy Orchestra invokes musical touchstones like funk maestros Tower of Power, iconoclastic modernists Kneebody, and the finest strains of '70s fusion. The music gets intricate, but Abouzied never loses sight of the gritty, soulful truth inherent in a deep groove.

Happy Orchestra recently recorded an album, set to be released later this year, and plays regularly around the region.

### **NW Emerging Artist** Alex Dugdale

Saxophonist/tap dancer Alex Dugdale is a graduate of Roosevelt High School and holds a Bachelors in Jazz from the Eastman School of Music and a Masters in Education from Seattle Pacific University. At Roosevelt, he performed in the jazz band and tapdanced in four annual productions of Ellington's Jazz Nutcracker. He began tap-dance study at the age of six, and appeared in many Seattle productions. He instructs in the music department of Bishop Blanchet High School, and teaches band at six different Catholic grade schools in the Seattle area. He also works as a private instructor with Edmonds-Woodway High School bands, and continues to perform in the greater Seattle area with his group, the 2015 Golden Ear-nominated FADE Quartet. He first performed with Seattle Repertory Jazz Orchestra as a dancer in 2006, and now performs on saxophone as a regular member of the band.

# **NW Instrumentalist of the Year** Dmitri Matheny

Acclaimed for his warm tone, soaring lyricism, and masterful technique,


flugelhornist/composer and recent Seattle transplant Dmitri Matheny has been lauded as "one of the most emotionally expressive improvisers of his generation" (International Review of Music). An honors graduate of the Berklee College of Music, Matheny vaulted onto the jazz scene in the 1990s as the protégé of jazz legend Art Farmer. Since then, he has garnered critical acclaim and a loyal international following, touring extensively throughout the United States, Europe, and Asia. With over 100 recordings to his credit, Matheny has released 11 albums as a leader. His latest is Jazz Noir, a fresh spin on crime jazz, film noir movie themes, and timeless classics, selections from which he recently performed in the monthly Art of Jazz series at the Seattle Art Museum.

#### **NW Vocalist of the Year** Kate Voss

Often blending genres together for a fresh take on standards, Kate Voss has been wowing Seattle audiences for the past 15 years. She received Special Mention at the Seattle-Kobe Jazz Vocal Queen contest in both 2014 and 2016, and was previously nominated for Golden Ear Vocalist of the Year in 2015. As one-half of vintage jazz duo

Sundae + Mr. Goessl, Voss performs and tours nationally with her husband, Golden Ear-nominated guitarist Jason Goessl. She also was a featured vocalist on the 2016 Northwest Recording of the Year, Birch Pereira & the Gin Joints' *Dream Man*.

#### Seattle Jazz Hall of Fame

Jay Clayton

An impressive vocalist, composer, and educator, Jay Clayton has performed and taught across the world. In 1963 she began her career performing the standards on the vibrant New

York music scene. However, she quickly became a prominent part of the free jazz movement. She has collaborated with many big names, including: Fred Hersch, Norma Winstone, Bobby McFerrin, Jane Ira Bloom, and Julian Priester, who was honored to induct his "dear friend" into the Hall of Fame.


Clayton is known and respected for her experience with free jazz and improvisation. She has taught extensively throughout the world and was on the jazz faculty of Cornish College for 20 years. She is currently on the jazz faculty at Peabody Institute in Baltimore.

#### Bill Anschell

JazzTimes wrote, "No matter where Anschell plays on the keyboard, he sounds like no other pianist."

Seattlelites should count themselves lucky to possess an artist of this caliber in their town. Originally hailing from the Emerald City, Anschell was away from Seattle for 25 years. His performance career took off in Atlanta, where his trio played at major festivals, including the 1996 Summer Olympic Games.

Anschell has played with jazz greats including Ron Carter, Benny Golson,



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and Russell Malone, and is the recipient of numerous Golden Ear Awards. Many of his compositions have appeared on television programs including "The West Wing," "The Wire," and the PBS movie *The Old Settler*.

#### **Special Awards**

Jim Knapp, in recognition that his forward-thinking work in jazz education has helped to shape Seattle's jazz legacy

Former Chair of the Music Department at Cornish and current Program Manager at Centrum Gregg Miller pre-

sented a Special Award to Jim Knapp (unfortunately not in attendance), who just celebrated his retirement from Cornish College of the Arts.

Jazz has been taught at Cornish College of the Arts since the 1960s, but came into its own when Knapp "codified the program as we know it now," in words of tribute Chuck Deardorf. It's been the better part of 50 years since then, and because of Knapp's pioneering work, Jazz at Cornish has national stature.

Knapp was for years the program head of Jazz within the Cornish Music Department. Among his awards are a National Endowment for the Arts Jazz Composition Fellowship, a Seattle Arts Commission Individual Artist Music Composition grant, and support from Meet the Composer and Artist Trust. In November 2006, he was honored by Cornish for "35 Years of Jazz." In 2007, he was inducted into the Earshot Jazz Hall of Fame, and in 2010 received the "Certificate of Excellence in Teaching" for 2009-2010 from Cornish College of the Arts.

Knapp has recorded as a composer and/ or performer on the ECM, A-Records, Origin, and Pony Boy record labels.

Julian Priester, in recognition that Seattle's jazz history is embellished by his distinguished legacy

In a special presentation, trombonist Ryan Keberle, who performed after the ceremony with his *Catharsis* project, was honored to present Julian Priester with a Special Award.

Earning a standing ovation as he made his way to the stage, Priester took the mic to deliver a message:

"You represent the saviors of jazz music," he told the crowd after thanking them. "It has been waving in popularity...and I encourage young people to seek out where the music that they love comes from."

Coming from an artist who's worked with Sun Ra, John Coltrane, and more, these words are made ever-stronger in light of today's threat to the arts in America.

Earshot's John Gilbreath closed the ceremony, after inducting Bill Anschell into the Hall of Fame, with a similar theme:

"We have to identify what our personal values are. We have to articulate them, we all have to stand for our value of our collective culture and the story of America that is told through the jazz culture," he said. "Jazz belongs to Black America, but there is no doubt that jazz has gone around the world. And what we have in Seattle is a key element to that. We are a spark plug."

### Gordon Grdina Quartet

"A guitar player of unbridled musical ingenuity," writes World Music Report of Gordon Grdina. "Few musicians—especially guitarists oud players—have a vision as broad and seemingly limitless as him." Juno Award-winning Vancouver-based oud player/guitarist Grdina is known for his incredible versatility and ability to bring a fresh and edgy vibe to any ensemble he joins or forms. His sound is a combination of his interests in mainstream jazz, free-form improvisation and Arabic classical music. A protégé of jazz great Gary Peacock, he is a well-respected contributor to the jazz and world music scenes and is constantly being sought out for new projects. As Pop Matters says, "Gordon

Grdina has managed to place a finger in every corner of the jazz/world fusion room."

His latest ensemble, the Gordon Grdina Quartet, is inspired by the complexity of Bartok, the freedom of Ornette Coleman, the intensity of Soundgarden, and the delicacy of Webern. His carefully formed quartet of Oscar Noriega (saxophone), Russ Lossing (piano), and Satoshi Takeishi (drums) combines the traditions of jazz improvisation, complex and memorable compositions, and a dynamic freedom to the music that ebbs and flows with each tune.

#### Bill McHenry & Thomas Marriott

Bill McHenry's compelling and highly personal approach to the tenor saxophone has garnered respect around the world. His most recent recording, *La Peur De Vide*, a duo date with jazz-great Andrew Cyrille, adds to an impressive and passionate discography featuring his compositions played by the likes of Paul Motian, Ben Monder, and Reid Anderson, among others. #### Le Mystère des Voix Bulgares

Saturday, April 22, 8pm Town Hall Seattle \$10-35 Welcomed by KBCS

Last month may have scored International Women's Day, but one of April's brilliant follow-ups comes April 22 at Town Hall: the Grammy Award-winning women's chorus of traditional and contemporary Bulgarian folk music, Le Mystère des Voix Bulgares. The unamplified vocal ensemble carries a dense history, a rare artistic gift, and an unearthly beauty, dissolving the separation between East and West, new and old, and popular and traditional music.

The chorus has performed over 1,200 concerts in a slew of prestigious performance halls while touring internationally throughout their history, which in itself is a mysterious lineage. The women's choir seeded around 1952 under founding director of Bulgaria's State Ensemble for Folk Songs Filip Kutev. Decades later, Swiss musicologist Marcel Cellier would track down this roots-based, avant-garde choir and record them as the primary feature of his 1975 compilation Le Mystère Des Voix Bulgares. Nearly another decade would pass before Cellier licensed his disc to British indie label 4AD, who in turn licensed the US rights to Elektra/ Nonesuch.

Once the Soviet Bulgarian choir received due Western European exposure, sales of Le Mystère Des Voix Bulgares became unprecedented for a foreign-language vocal album. The name Le Mystère Des Voix Bulgares,

now a trademark of the choir, was registered in 1990 by Cellier himself.

Translated to "The Mystery of the Bulgarian Voices," the groups' vocalists combine diaphonic, often dissonant, singing to produce a breathtaking, otherworldly sound "somewhere between the Muslim call to prayer and the Beach Boys" (The Guardian). It's in part to this "magic" – and the group's unique choral arrangements – that the ensemble has found remarkable success in mastering Bulgaria's diverse and age-old vocal traditions, while sounding strikingly modern and original.

Over 20 women embodying different folklore regions in Bulgaria through traditional flowered costumes comprise the choir we see today. Their concert will be an unveiling of centuries of Bulgarian vocal tradition, through a gamut of repertoire containing complex layers of singular note punctuations, microtonal harmonies, and ancient melodies.

Over the course of a two-part concert, the choir performs songs that tell about daily life and traditions in Bulgaria, a cultural melting pot with Greek, Slavic, Ottoman, and Persian influences and a rich heritage of dance,

music, and costumes. While most lyrics translate to describe the life of a Balkan woman, the act of singing has also remained a foundation for many women of this culture.

The event follows the expert direction of Dr. Dora Hristova, who has been Artistic Director and conductor of the female vocal choir for more than 25 years. A graduate of the Bulgarian State Conservatoire, Hristova contributes to academia as a lecturer at the Art Academy in Plovdiv, Bulgaria, and to the fields of sonority and vocal ensemble studies. Under her direction, the choir was appointed the Ambassador of European culture in 2007.

It's difficult to encapsulate just how widespread the affect of this enduring world music force is. It was in part due to the admiration by Bauhaus' Peter Murphy that the choral group was recognized by 4AD's co-founder Ivo Watts-Russell, who has called the original Le Mystère des Voix Bulgares album "a highlight of my life." More recently, the music of Le Mystère des Voix Bulgares extends into playlists and soundtracks from artists such as Gorillaz and Werner Herzog, and the women themselves have been a fea-

tured accompaniment to Bobby Mc-Ferrin.

familial apprenticeship from an early age. Clayton honors the legacy of his father and all his musical ancestors through a commitment to artistic exploration, innovation, and reinvention. His music is a celebration of the inherent differences in musical perspectives that promote true artistic synergy. Inclusive sensibilities have allowed him to perform and record with such distinctive artists as Diana Krall, Roy Hargrove, Dianne Reeves, Ambrose Akinmusire, Dayna Stephens, and John Scofield. Clayton also has enjoyed an extended association since early 2013, touring and recording with saxophone legend Charles Lloyd.

Joe Sanders has made a name for himself through his versatility, dedication, and steady pulse. He is one of the most sought-after young bass players of his generation and has played with Ravi Coltrane, Herbie Hancock, Jimmy Heath, Wayne Shorter, and Dave Brubeck, among others.


# Fourth Annual Jackson Street Jazz Walk


