LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

No Black, No Jazz

Someone once said that "jazz was born in the American South, in the collision of Black, European, and Indigenous cultures." Of those three, I believe that jazz most firmly belongs to Black America. And even though jazz is subsequently being embraced by all cultures around the world, it is done so with the clear, if implicit, understanding that jazz is a fundamental expression of Black culture, Black experience, Black lives.

What is most disturbing about the opening quote is that the referenced "collision" is still unfolding at the intersecting soul of American life, in the dark and in the light, without regard to any stop sign or mile post.

We'd like to believe that we've come a long way down the road, and that, automatically, progress means enlightenment. We practice hard, and we get better. Our chances for wreckage should be diminished, right? I guess not. Some of us would also be inclined to lay recent racial collisions at the feet of our idiot/maniac bus driver, but that would be short-sighted.

Donald Trump is a symptom. To be sure, he's a big one—an ugly and festering sore on the American body, apparently happy to spread the infection and jack up the fever. But racial problems are at the core of the American experiment. Biographies of John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, and others are very clear about conscious decisions to set the issue of slavery aside, in order to see a clearer (read: easier) path to a



"more perfect union." And still, here we are. We have a lot of work to do, and clearly, we can't just bring this thing in to the dealer for repair.

If I was as hip as I'd like to be, this is the part where I'd drop in the answers. I don't have them. But I'll work harder on myself. At some points, jazz has been an equalizer integrating bandstands and broadcasts for the sake of the music, and, by the way, to show the rest of the country that it was the right thing to do. Lionel Hampton talked about the piano, and how you had to have the black keys and the white keys to make music. That's all nice, but that's not going to do it. We all have to get in there and do the work.

Black Lives Matter.

And, we've got a jazz festival coming up. Stay tuned for details.

PROFILE

Dawn Clement: Earshot Jazz Festival Resident Artist

The designation of "resident artist" for the annual Earshot Jazz Festival is meant to highlight an artist who has made outstanding contributions to the overall jazz ecology here in the Puget Sound area. This year, well over 60% of the individual artists in this year's festival live in the Seattle area, and as 2017 Resident Artist, Dawn Clement stands out mightily here as a multitalented composer, performer and vocalist.

Festival-wise, Clement will perform in several concerts in a series of duo performances she devised with a wide range of musicians-some from Seattle, some from New York City. Also, following a standing-ovation solo performance of Thelonious Monk music at the 2014 Earshot Jazz Festival, she has been chosen to present 10 solo Monk pieces for his birthday tribute concert on October 10 at the Seattle Art Museum, And, if that were not enough productivity, Earshot has invited Clement to present a concert of her own work on November 11 at Cornish College, where she is adjunct instructor of piano.

Clement is a winner of three Golden Ear Awards from Earshot voters in recent years, for best performance and outstanding artist (twice), among other prestigious awards. She has completed five albums and is called upon to teach at institutes across the nation (for more information, see dawnclement.com). *Earshot Jazz* met with the acclaimed artist to discuss her background and her perspectives on jazz today.

Earshot Jazz: In your music training, what was the most important thing that led you to the creative work that you are doing today?

Dawn Clement: I started classical piano at 10 and started playing jazz in high school. I got a Cornish scholarship for jazz performance and completed my degree in 2000. And I just finished my master's in composition at Vermont College of Fine Arts. My Cornish faculty and Vermont faculty were so inspiring to me and I have performed with many of them. My teachers taught me to be disciplined, and how to practice, and I have built relationships with them along the way. I have learned a lot from Julian Priester, Jane Ira Bloom, and I learn from students and colleagues alike. The most important thing is that there is not one thing that is most important. It is the journey and the many things you encounter that are important.

EJ: Do you enjoy teaching, and what do you think of today's jazz music students?

DC: In 2000 after I graduated I joined the faculty at Cornish. Teaching the piano lab class, I enjoy my students and try to reinvent the class as I go. I also teach private students, combos, high school groups, and junior high school level, too.

Jazz students are different today, compared to when I was one. Many are very dedicated and I love their music, which shows they are interested in a lot of different things. They are not just focused on listening to, and playing, jazz in one way. They have shown me music styles that are taking it to the next step. Some are more original and closer to music on the streets. It's such a digital world now and they have different skills and interests than I did, for example some students can make their own records now.

EJ: Do you enjoy solo work/performance? Or do you prefer ensemble work/performance? Why, and what do you look for in ensemble partners?

DC: I like both solo and ensemble work. Solo work is vulnerable work where I stick out my hand to the audience and communicate with people.

I also like to play with others, and improvise with people. It keeps us all honest and in real time. The music is conversational. It involves our reaction time and skills and personalities. A bandleader I once worked with liked that the ensemble people were all from different backgrounds but found a similar reference point. What I look for are players who listen deeply and are generous, forgiving in the moment, and have a sense of humor.

I also get to put my things aside when I play as a side man. I play here in town with my quartet, and also with Julian Priester, when he plays here. I am playing in New York about three times a year. And other out-of-town places, too. My family includes three kids so I'm lucky to have a great husband who helps out. *EJ*: What is the legacy of Thelonious Monk today? How is his influence felt?

DC: The first jazz tune I ever learned was Monk. I have been playing Monk since the beginning. Obviously, the Thelonious Monk Institute of Jazz and the Monk competition continue his legacy. His legacy comes from the fact that his music is so accessible, everyone can identify with it. Why? Because of the ways his melodies and solos are so strong. The tunes get repeated, like in the blues. Playing his music, I am not an expert but I find new things to bring to it. It makes sense that his music is still performed on his 100th birthday.

EJ: What is the importance and direction of jazz today?

DC: I think it has the same importance it always has had. It involves improvisation, what is not written on the page. Some say it's getting diluted, trickling into other areas of music. Various artists are figuring ways to search out new forms. In the '60s, '70, and '80s, each decade there were certain trends in jazz. But now there is not one way of doing that, it is more

A graduate of Roosevelt High School and Berklee College of Music, the young musician actively performs with the 200 Trio, The Arsonists, and The Kareem Kandi Band, and leads a weekly jam session at The Angry Beaver in Greenwood. He is also an educator, and has collaborated with musicians including Joe Lovano, Wynton Marsalis, Gerald Clayton, and others.

Originally from Indianapolis, drummer Brian Kirk studied jazz at Indiana University under the late David Baker. Having lived in San Francisco and New York City, Kirk has played with such artists as Joe Henderson, Gladys Knight, Dizzy Gillespie, and Bobby Hutcherson, as well as the orchestras of Lionel Hampton and Count Basie. 
The 2017 Bellhaven Jazz Festival

Saturday, September 9, 1pm Fairhaven Village Green, Bellingham Free & open to the public

On Saturday, September 9, Jud Sherwood's Bellingham-based Jazz Project presents the seventh annual Bellhaven Jazz Festival, an opportunity for audiences to indulge in great Northwest jazz with artists from across the region. With the support of the festival's generous sponsors, this event is free-ofcharge and open to music lovers of all ages. Guests are invited to bring their own picnic blankets or lawn chairs, check out libations from the beer and wine garden, and celebrate excellent music in historic Fairhaven Village Green. Enjoy unmatched views in this gorgeous setting and delight in a laid-back day of jazz, blues, and Latin sounds.

Johnaye Kendrick, beloved Seattle jazz vocalist, opens the festival at 1pm with her quartet. She performs original compositions as well as personal interpretations of favorite jazz and blues standards. The talented multi-instrumentalist often accompanies herself on harmonium, violin, viola, and percussion. In 2013, she was nominated for a Golden Ear Award for Northwest Vocalist of the year. A dedicated educator, Kendrick currently serves as an Associate Professor of Jazz Voice at Cornish College of the Arts.

The jazz quartet of guitarist Ed Dunsavage and flugelhornist Dmitri Matheny takes the stage at 2:30pm. Dunsavage has performed regularly around the Pacific Northwest for the past 25 years with many artists, including

Bernadette Peters, Greta Matassa, Mimi Fox, John Stowell, and others. Matheny is renowned for his warm tone, soaring lyricism, and masterful technique, and is lauded as "one of the most emotionally expressive improvisers of his generation" (*International Review of Music*). An honors graduate of the Berklee College of Music, Matheny vaulted onto the jazz scene in the 1990s as the protégé of jazz legend Art Farmer. Since then, he has garnered critical acclaim and a loyal international following, touring extensively throughout the United States, Europe, and Asia, and has released 11 albums as a leader. The quartet highlights timeless classics from the Art Farmer/ Jim Hall songbook, modern favorites by Jimmy Webb, Pat Metheny, and Keith Jarrett, and favorite standards of American Popular Song. With Jeff Johnson on bass and Jud Sherwood on drums, they deliver an emotionally expressive, soulful experience.

At 4pm, Blues Union transports listeners to a place of soulful and bluesy sounds. Led by B-3 organist and singer John Carswell, the quartet also includes drummer Jud Sherwood, who has performed with Carswell throughout the region for 20 years, as well as saxophonist Josh Cook and guitarist Brian Cunningham, two Northwest musicians who perform regularly as sidemen and leaders of their own groups.

Rounding out the festival's lineup at 5:30pm is EntreMundos Quarteto, a Seattle-based band with an infectious mix of deep Brazilian roots music and world rhythms-a deft blending of funk, jazz, and soul with the classic sounds of samba and bossa nova. With the elegant and lilting vocals of Adriana Giordano, the superbly versatile Eric Verlinde on piano, and the locked-in rhythm section of Jeff Busch on percussion and Dean Schmidt on bass, EntreMundos Quarteto delivers the goods: seductive, sparkling, and substantial, light as a feather but with a deep, earthy groove, and guaranteed to move the hips and lift the soul.

DjangoFest Northwest 2017

September 20–24 Whidbey Island Center for the Arts Langley, WA

The legacy of Django Reinhart and gypsy jazz—a guitar-led style inspired by traditional gypsy melodies with American and Parisian jazz influences—lives on in full force on Whidbey Island. The DjangoFest Northwest festival, hosted by the Whidbey Island Center for the Arts (WICA) in Langley, WA, will return for its 17th year as the largest gypsy jazz festival in North America, and the second largest in the world. Each year, thousands of fans from the world over come together both as listeners and as participants in the gypsy jazz tradition.

Among this year's most prominent performances include the Samson Schmitt/Tim Kliphuis string quintet, featuring the first US performance of Samson's cousins Panche Weiss and Benii Winterstein; members of the Netherland's Rosenburg Trio, a perennial favorite at the Dutch Edison Jazz awards: the return of the Robin Nolan Trio, which was the festival's first international act in 2000; the allfemale quartet Christine Tassan et les Imposteures from Montreal; Antoine Boyer and Samuelito, a French duo devoted to "gypsy meets flamenco"; and 13-year-old guitar prodigy and 2017 DjangoFest Saga Award-winner Henry Acker, performing with his father, Victor, and uncle, Dana. Far from strictly following a set program, visitors will also have the chance to experience unscheduled, fully improvised "djams" throughout the festival and Langley. A workshop series will allow audiences

the chance to learn more about playing and creating gypsy jazz music themselves. Many of these workshops are taught by the headlining artists, and span topics ranging from basic technique to in-depth explorations of the gypsy jazz style.

DjangoFest Northwest started in the year 2000, after Nicolas Lehr of Whidbey Island attended the Festival Django Reinhardt in France that same year. Lehr encountered guitarist Robin Nolan there, and they endeavored to bring a similar event to the United States. Working with WICA and its executive director Stacie Burgua, they launched the inaugural DjangoFest Northwest over two days with performances by Pearl Django and Robin Nolan. Today, DjangoFest Northwest is a five-day event, and second only to the Festival Django Reinhardt in its prominence in gypsy jazz.

Earshot Jazz Presents: Tim Berne's Snakeoil



Thursday, September 21, 8pm The Royal Room 5000 Rainier Ave S \$10–20

Composer and saxophonist Tim Berne's music trades on the tradition of bandleaders such as James Brown, Sam Rivers, and Henry Threadgill, though follows its own multi-paneled course: with the pace of a thriller and the momentum of a page-turner, the plot of sequenced episodes twists and turns, settles on cliffhangers, and bucks back on course. Antagonists and protagonists, set in the material of sound rather than space, pace the stage of instrumentation in characterizations naturally extended from Berne's own ingenious reimagining of group and solo roles.

Berne's critically acclaimed group Snakeoil, playing September 21 at The Royal Room, well represents the visual personality of his music with a cast including Berne (alto saxophone), Oscar

Noriega (clarinet), Matt Mitchell (piano), and Ches Smith (drums).

Making their eponymous debut on ECM in 2011, Snakeoil has challenged and excited audiences with their orchestral dynamism on releases including 2015's *You've Been Watching Me*, which, according to *The Guardian*, "delivers a fascinating wealth of intricate musicianship." Their fourth and newest release, *Incidentals*, is out September 8. A late bloomer on the New York jazz and improvised scene who did not pick up the alto until college, Berne has nevertheless managed to establish in the past 20 years a reputation as a formidable composer, producer, instrumentalist, bandleader, and owner of his self-established label, Screwgun Records.

Brooklyn-based multi-instrumentalist and reed specialist Oscar Noriega brings a scorching passion to the group on clarinets, echoing the influences of some of his collaborators such as Dewey Redman, Lee Konitz and Anthony Braxton.

Pianist and composer Matt Mitchell trades his time outside of Snakeoil in a dizzying array of other ensembles, including Rudresh Mahanthappa's Bird Calls, and the Dave Douglas Quintet. Recipient of the 2015 Doris Duke Impact Award, Mitchell has shown a deep understanding of contemporary trends in music through his interdisciplinary approach to the keyboard. He'll be featured on this year's Earshot Jazz Festival, playing a solo tribute to Tim Berne on October 24 at the Chapel Performance Space.

"I do not concern myself with style or genre," percussionist Ches Smith has said. "When playing, especially, I am not trying to reach into a particular bag." Eloquent but straight-to-thepoint, Smith's playing has been the cornerstone to projects led by Terry Riley, Marc Ribot, John Tchicai, and the experimental rock group Xiu Xiu. One of the original members of Snakeoil, Smith belies the group's spectacle of sounds, which never seems to drown the intense, individual, and indivisible voices of its members, sure to present an unrepeatable performance.

Brooklyn Raga Massive: John Coltrane Birthday Tribute

On what would have been John Coltrane's 91st birthday, Town Hall Seattle and Earshot Jazz welcome the globally recognized artists' collective Brooklyn Raga Massive (BRM) to play unique homage to the legendary jazz saxophonist.

Melding chamber ragas, funk, pop, jazz, western classical, and African traditions, BRM will bring Coltrane back into being. The performers include Jay Gandhi (bansuri), Pawan Benjamin (saxophone), Trina Basu (violin), Brandee Younger (harp), Marc Cary (piano, Rhodes), Neel Murgai (sitar), Sameer Gupta (drums, tabla), Rashaan Carter (bass) and Michael Gam (bass), Arun Ramamurthy (carnatic violin).

BRM is a collective of forward-thinking musicians rooted in and inspired by Indian classical music. Hailed as "Leaders of the Raga Renaissance" by the *New Yorker*, BRM creates original composed music by BRM member musicians and represented ensembles, presents over 70 concerts annually with an ongoing weekly concert and raga jam session series and specialty concerts, and co-presents an annual 24 Ragas Live festival.

BRM features both traditional Indian classical performances as well as cross-cultural Raga-inspired music. In particular, the culturally inclusive nature of BRM has not only built a strong community, but has become an incubator of new music collaborations with sounds indigenous to Brooklyn. As collective member David Ellenbogen states, "There is something magical happening right now. There is a new generation of musicians who are disciples of some of the greatest living Indian Classical musicians, but who also speak the languages of jazz, funk, reggae-not as outsiders, but as insiders of both traditions."

Now a 501(c)(3) non-profit, BRM's first seeds as a humble music collective began in 2012 in a Prospect Heights dive bar with a weekly concert series and jam session. Over the years, this ongoing weekly event has helped to cultivate a vibrant community of musicians and music lovers, all while embracing new artists and opening doors for cross-cultural collaboration reflective of the current Brooklyn musical landscape.

The inclusive and spontaneous nature of BRM is apropos in celebrating the legendary Coltrane, whose ideas went on to shape jazz, improvised, and experimental music as we know it today.

Jazz Travels: Kaslo Jazz Etc. Summer Music Festival

Lakeside stages, Preservation Hall Jazz Band & BadBadNotGood, impromptu collaborations, youngsters, and a full moon in the Kootenay Rockies

Now crossing the quarter-century mark, the well-established Kaslo Jazz Etc. Festival is recognized as one of the most beautiful destination music events in British Columbia. This year was no different; in fact, it was the biggest and best yet, says executive director Paul Hinrichs of the sold-out event.

Kaslo, B.C., is the largest city on Kootenay Lake despite having more feet of beaches than number of residents. The preferable route from Seattle to the rejuvenating Kaslo hub will take you through Ellensburg and Spokane, leading you another 120 miles north of the U.S. border into the Kootenay mountain region. Winding rural roads feature the occasional bridge amidst powerful snow-capped scenery and glassy waters. Frequent regional buses trace the route, averaging a public transport rider an hour and a half between Kaslo and its southern "Queen City," Nelson, a semi-Victorian, bohemian lake town nestled in the Selkirk Mountains of southeast B.C.

Once in Kaslo, the all-ages August festival reps a fantastic array of local food trucks and pop-up shops, a cool beer garden, a beach dance floor, and a docked lakeside stage behind which we saw a full moon rise above Mt. Loki's stunning silhouette.

Celebrating the diversity of the 6,000 attendee three-day event, the directors infuse their one-size-fits-all weekend with a diverse lineup of jazz, blues, funk, rock, folk, world music, "etc.," from the region and beyond.

The result of this year's creative bookings-and upping the artist budget-was big Canadian features like jazz futurists BadBadNotGood, long running rock-and-roll foursome The Sheepdogs, sonic fivesome The Tequila Mockingbird Orchestra, northern instrumentals and throat singing by The Jerry Cans, and inventive hip-hop/ tribal beats band A Tribe Called Red. From the States, Mexican-American blues rock legends Los Lobos ("La Bamba") and California bluesman Sonny Rhodes made the trip. Dave Matthews Band's saxophonist Jeff Coffin played in In Orbit, featuring Jaco's bassist son Felix Pastorius, returning for a second unique set Sunday night upon Charles Bradley & His Extraordinaires disappointing, but understandable, cancellation due to health concerns.

One of the festival's biggest gets this year was New Orleans-based Preservation Hall Jazz Band, who played their rapturous encore while marching through a dancing audience on the sandy shore. That was this year's highlight for Hinrichs, who described watching them play at his festival as "a life-affirming moment" (*Nelson Star*).

For those hanging out between heavy-hitting sets, jazz workshops, a balloon artist, and yoga classes were on site. The festival also brought in U.S. Slam Poetry Champion Shane Koyczan to perform rebel rhymes alongside delicate band arrangements. Another notable collaboration occurred when famous Canadian children's music performer Fred Penner was spontaneously joined onstage by Nelson-based performance troupe Circus Acts Insomniacs dressed as acrobatic unicorns.

A substantial makeup of the audience was off-shift volunteers, the festival staff boasting nearly 400 helpers. Shawna, a volunteer I talked to, briefed me on how she came to volunteer: she'd just moved here from southern city Castlegar and was trying to plug into the town that she now calls home.

"I've never had this type of community. You go to the dairy store and have a ten-minute conversation with a stranger," she said of her experience settling into the 1,000-resident town. As for her volunteer slot at the festival, she said, "I'm having a great time; the kids are kept busy, and I can read my book."

While a hefty majority of attendees were local "Koots," several folks had made even greater trips than ours across the states to be at the annual B.C. event. Festivalgoer Shivaun Perez has been a staple attendee at the festi-

val for the last 16 of the 25 total years of the festival. The Venezuelan-born Texan makes the annual exodus from Austin, this year even bringing her horses on the drive with her.

"I'm a music appreciator and festivals are a great place to regenerate," said Perez.

Music kicked off Friday, August 4, with Los Lobos, Sonny Rhodes, eightpiece Kootenay Soul band and R&B singer Velle, and Nelson's own jazzy house/global bass all-female DJ group Meow Mix sampling lively folk melodies, Americana, and world beats. We flocked with the majority to the Friday finale of three native producers from Ottawa, cleverly going by A Tribe Called Red. ATCR's inventive mix of hip-hop, electronic technique, and samples from aboriginal culture creates the sort of music one would think of if describing the contemporary evolution of the powwow. Long-listed for the Polaris Music Prize for their newest album, the boys are gaining a global audience for their energetic sets that uniquely weave powwow melodies through danceable drumming.



The conclusion of our first night in Kaslo led to a leisurely walk back to the Southbeach campground around the bend of the venue's shore. Spills of happy concertgoers took the same path, some continuing into the cracks of Kaslo town for the Jazz Fest sponsored after-party.

Saturday events opened early with local acts and Fred Penner entertaining families in the heat of the afternoon. Dope Soda, a fresh concoction of six top jazz, rock, and reggae musicians from Vancouver Island, serenaded swimmers and paddle boarders who were reprieved of the forest fire smoke that day.

Jazz lovers rejoiced for the anticipated sounds of Preservation Hall Jazz Band playing that night. Undeniably, the New Orleans collective were in their own league, producing the tightest tunes of the lineup. Dressing the role, the cats donned a mismatch of fedoras, ties, button downs, and sunglasses past sunset.

True to their New Orleans and Afro-Cuban roots, the group bounced between percussion vessels—multiple tambourines and a drumline bass drum—and a full assortment of tuned brass. Keyboardist Kyle Roussel sported an electric tone to his Roland, interestingly mistakable for the glides of a classic Gibson.

Bandleader Ben Jaffe (bass, tuba) made a huge impression on the elated crowd. He thanked the crowd for bringing their kids: "That's the best part, some of those kids dancing out there!"

Roussel added, "We want to thank all the kids for dragging their parents out here too." Just having played Coachella and Bonnaroo this year, the New Orleans legends more than left their mark during their only Western Canadian date this year.

Next to the huge talents of PHJB, the four young stars of BadBadNot-Good put on a comparably impressive Sunday night show. BBNG has toured the globe with content from their beloved 2014 record of brash yet refined angular jazz improvisations, lush ballads, krautrock, and futuristic hip-hop tinged rhythms, and they've collaborated with some of the most innovative artists working today.

The well-attended final day show held a few extra devout audience members clutching the band's vinyl they'd gotten signed earlier that day.

"BBNG is the reason I'm here," expressed audience member and fellow musician Erich Hintz. "They don't really tour in B.C. or play in Canada very often anymore; mostly they're being booked on European tours."

Hintz laughed: "You've got to be really good to get people to dance to 7/8 and 15/16 times."

Earlier that day, folks trekked in for early sets by Canadian swing duo Blue Moon Marquee and versatile crossover duo Moontricks. Following BBNG's memorable set, Canadian vocal soulstress Erica Dee proved led a band of her own after years supporting artists such as Mos Def, Questlove, and Beats Antique.

Grounded by Felix's distinctly Pastorius bass movement, Nashville saxman Jeff Coffin led In Orbit in a sensitive, free flowing second set on Sunday, during which the band resurrected The Jerry Cans' violinist and textural throat singer for even more imaginative music full of great grooves.

The Kaslo Jazz Etc. Festival is, simply put, at the top of its game as far as big small festivals go. Killer artists and perfect setting aside, it would lack its magic if it weren't for the unbelievably pleasant locals, cool young families, and relaxed campers that support it—and welcome newcomers—year on end.
